

Directors of Daytona Golf and Country Club Elected; Pres. Knappe Makes Report

A regular list of directors were reinstated at the election of the Daytona Golf and Country Club members at the Casino Burgoyne yesterday afternoon. A meeting will be held Tuesday afternoon to elect president of the club and a secretary for the ensuing year.

The directors reinstated unanimously were: C. H. Knappe, H. E. P. N. Conrad, L. E. Holmes, C. C. Archibald, W. M. Hankins, E. H. Woodruff, E. P. Woodbury and M. P. Wood.

The following report was made by president of the club to those assembled in the Chamber of Commerce rooms at a business session immediately following the election of a board of directors:

"I have the following to report of progress made on the course to date: ten holes completed so far

as the construction work is concerned. Naturally there will be more or less re-grassing done and also top dressing to be applied, especially on the sandy spots, but this will obviously come under the head of upkeep of the course.

"I will endeavor to state what has been done so far on the seven remaining holes. No. 19 has been plowed, with the exception of a small place on the east end, but has not been cleared of roots. All of No. 11 has been plowed but not raked; No. 13 has been date, and what we hope may be accomplished during the coming year. The permanent green built; No. 14 has been plowed but not raked; the green for this hole has been built; Nos. 15 and 16 have been plowed, raked and grass planted as has also about two-thirds of No. 17.

"From the foregoing you will see that practically two-thirds of the work on the remaining seven holes has been done. It will be a serious drawback if we are obliged to abandon work now, but unless we are more successful in disposing of some of our club bonds this will have to be done and much of the work that has been done will be lost.

"Unless sufficient funds are found to carry on the work on the last seven holes immediately it will be far better for us to abandon these holes for the coming season and apply all energy to placing the ten holes we have in first class condition.

"It will be necessary for us to build permanent lockers equipped with showers, lavatories and locker, that we may adequately provide the many players that I know will wish to avail themselves of the privileges on our course. The matter of piping for the course and getting sufficient water supply will have to be gone into. Tentative arrangements have been made to have a four-inch main laid to the site of the proposed club house; from this point we can carry a much smaller line to the different holes, thus assuring us that our greens for the coming year can be kept in perfect condition and making good our claim that we have the best course in the state. The possibilities are there; it is up to the directors to see that they are carried out.

"Your directors have practically arranged to have Charles Clark, of the Engineers club, Long Island, in charge of the course next season and he is to bring with him an assistant and also a green keeper. Clark is a professional of excellent standing and will no doubt be an asset to the club.

"There has been paid into the treasury from the sale of bonds, \$33,485.74. Of this amount the hotels of Daytona paid \$4,000, the business men \$7,000 and our good friends from across the river have paid \$8,200. The balance, \$13,785.75, was subscribed by private interests. The total amount received to date is \$52,104.64 and the expenditures \$49,942.22, leaving a balance on hand of \$2,461.42. This balance will keep us going for about ten or eleven weeks, provided we do not start work on the last seven holes.

Florida East Coast Will Build Double Track Over St. Johns

JACKSONVILLE, March 26.—Plans for the new Florida East Coast railway bridge, spanning the St. Johns river at Jacksonville, which has been contemplated for the past two years, as previously announced, are now rapidly nearing completion, according to a statement made at the general offices of the company yesterday.

While no definite date has been announced for the beginning of construction work, it is anticipated the work will be completed within two years, which will necessitate letting of contracts within a short time.

When the election carried to bond the county for a St. John's river bridge there was a discussion of the plans of the Florida East Coast for double-tracking a bridge across the river, but only recently have the plans been completed for the construction of this bridge.

Generally speaking, according to reports from the office of the Florida East Coast yesterday, the plans will provide for the erection of a bridge close to and paralleling the present bridge, of much the same design with heavier steel construction, and as soon as this is completed with one track, the present bridge can be torn away and replaced with the other unit, joining to make a double track bridge across the river, with draw meeting practically the same specifications.

As yet no bids have been taken, or estimates compiled of the cost of the construction, the cost being estimated in a general way as from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000.

It is not anticipated that the construction of the bridge can begin under 90 days, as it generally requires from 60 to 90 days to secure the necessary permit from the war department for any bridge construction work over a navigable stream.

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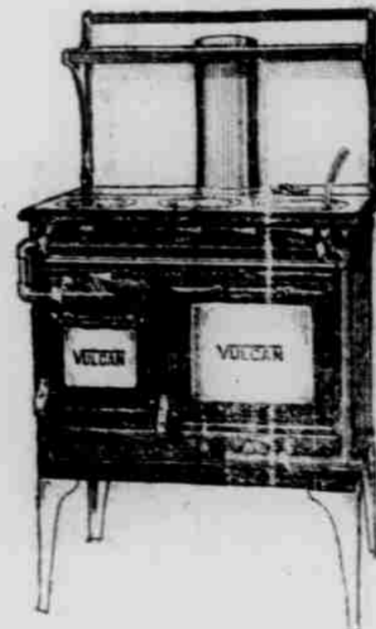
