U. S. WAS READY TO USE FORCE IN OPENING PORT OF PROGRESSO

CARRANZA GOT BUSY WHEN UNCLE SAM SAID "GET A MOVE ON, QUICK"

WASHINGTON, MARCH 15.—PRESIDENT WILSON SERVED NOTICE CARRANZA THAT THE PORT OF PROGRESSO, MEXICO, THROUGH WHICH COMES PRACTICALLY ALL THE SISAL USED IN MAKING HARTING TWINE, MUST BE KEPT OPEN. CARRANZA IMMEDIATELY ABANDONED THE BLOCKADE OF THE PORT. IT BECAME KNOWN TODAY THAT THE UNITED STATES WAS PREPARED TO USE FORCE, IF NECESSARY, IN EFFECTING ACQUIESCENCE WITH ITS DEMANDS.

BRITISH LOST SLIGHTLY AT STELOI.
 PARIS, March 15 (Official).—The British suffered slight reverses today at Steloi, the Germans driving them back in an attack. Later the British regained their losses partially. German assaults in the Argonnes were repulsed.

LONDON DISBELIEVES REPORT OF PROBABLE SURRENDER OF SMYRNA

LONDON, MARCH 15.—WHILE TENEDOS DISPATCHES STATE THAT THE SURRENDER OF SMYRNA, WHICH IS BEING BOMBARDED BY TURKISH WARSHIPS, IS IMMINENT, ADVICES FROM ATHENS INDICATE THAT THE ALLIES' FLEET ATTACKING THE DARDANELLES IS MEETING GREAT DIFFICULTIES, AND IT IS BELIEVED THAT THE BIG GUNS OF THE TURKISH FORTS INFLICTED GREATER DAMAGE THAN THE OFFICIAL REPORTS SAY. SMYRNA IS BADLY BATTERED, AND PORTIONS OF THE CITY HAVE BEEN DESTROYED.

CONSTANTINOPLE, MARCH 15.—MORE OF THE ALLIES' WARSHIPS HAVE BEEN DAMAGED IN THE OPERATIONS IN THE DARDANELLES. PORTS OF THE HOSTILE WARSHIPS TO APPROACH TURKISH MINE FIELDS FAILED. THE ALLIES' CLAIM TO HAVE REDUCED THE FORTS AT THE ENTRANCE TO THE WATERWAY IS DENIED. IT IS DECLARED THAT THE ENEMY'S BOMBARDMENTS HAVE BEEN INEFFECTIVE.

ATHENS, MARCH 15.—IT IS REPORTED THAT THE GERMAN CRUISER GOEBEN HAS BEEN WRECKED BY STRIKING A MINE IN THE HELLESPOINTE SEA. THE VESSEL WAS BEACHED AND THE BIG GUNS TAKEN ASHORE TO THE FORTS. TOGETHER WITH THE CRUISER SLEAU, THE GOEBEN WAS TO AID TURKISH SHIPS IN DEFENDING CONSTANTINOPLE IN THE FINAL BATTLE.

DANISH SHIP MADE PRISONER BY GERMANS.
 COPENHAGEN, March 15.—The Danish steamer Bryszel, bound from Copenhagen for Stockholm, has been seized by a German warship and taken to the island of Heligoland. The Bryszel touched Scotland on March 1.

 SUDDEN ATTACK SATURDAY EVENING RESULTED IN ALMOST INSTANT DEATH OF MRS. LAUGHLIN, OF NEW YORK.

BLOCKADE OF GERMANY OFFICIALLY DECLARED TODAY BY ENGLAND

LONDON, MARCH 15.—THE LONG EXPECTED PROCLAMATION DECLARING A BLOCKADE OF THE WHOLE OF GERMANY WAS DECLARED TODAY.
 EVERY MERCHANT VESSEL WHICH SAILED AFTER MARCH 1ST TO OTHER THAN A GERMAN PORT, CARRYING GOODS OF THE ENEMY TO DESTINATION; OR ANY VESSEL SAILING FROM OTHER THAN A GERMAN PORT, CARRYING GOODS ORIGINATING WITH THE ENEMY, MAY BE REQUIRED TO DISCHARGE ITS CARGO AT A BRITISH PORT OR AN ALLIED PORT.
 ANY COUNTRY WHICH DECLARES NO COMMERCE IS INTENDED FOR OR ORIGINATING IN GERMANY, OR BELONGING TO GERMAN SUBJECTS, MAY ENJOY THE PROTECTION OF THE BRITISH FLAG.

NOT SATISFIED WITH SITUATION, CZAR GOES TO FRONT IN POLAND

PETROGRAD, MARCH 15.—THE CZAR LEFT FOR THE WESTERN FRONT TODAY TO GET FIRST-HAND INFORMATION CONCERNING THE ACTUAL SITUATION. IT IS REPORTED THAT HE IS DISSATISFIED WITH THE RECENT CONDUCT OF MILITARY AFFAIRS.
 THE GERMANS ARE SENDING HEAVY RE-ENFORCEMENTS INTO SULESKI. ANOTHER GREAT BATTLE IS IMMINENT WEST OF THE NIEMEN RIVER. IT IS BELIEVED THAT THE GERMANS SPREAD ACROSS POSITIONS NORTH OF THE NAREW AND BOBR RIVERS TO THE NUMBER OF A MILLION MEN.

MASSACRES BY TURKS AROUSE GREEKS' FURY

ATHENS, MARCH 15.—TURKISH SOLDIERS ARE REPORTED TO HAVE MASSACRED 60 GREEK FAMILIES IN THE VILLAGE OF YEMARI, IN ASIA MINOR. AT AVILIK, MUSSULMAN TROOPS TERRORIZED THE TOWN, KILLING SIX NATIVES AND 40 GREEKS.
 THE FEELING IN GREECE TODAY HAS ALMOST REACHED THE BREAKING POINT.

LONDON ADMITS SINKING OF THREE MORE SHIPS.
 LONDON, March 15.—It is officially admitted that the Florazan, Headlands and Hartdale, three British merchantmen, have lately been sunk by German submarines. The Florazan was torpedoed near the mouth of Bristol channel last Thursday, after landing a cargo of cotton from Galveston at Havre. The Headlands, also used in the American trade, was torpedoed off Sicily Islands, Friday. The Hartdale was torpedoed Friday in the Irish Sea.
