REYNOLDS' SISTER CLEARS DYMOND PART IN SHOOTING

Daytona, June 25.—William H. Decker, of Key West, manager of the Consolidated Cigar Co., departed for his home last evening accompanied by Mrs. Decker and children. Mrs. Decker is a sister of Lorillard Reynolds, who was assaulted and shot at Seabreeze some time ago. On departing yesterday, Mr. Decker stated that he had gone over the shooting affair with Mr. Reynolds, and that both himself and Mr. Reynolds are convinced beyond any doubt that Russell S. Dymond, the young real estate man who was with Mr. Reynolds at the time of the assault, was in no way connected with the assault and had no previous knowledge of the attack. Mr. Decker states that Mr. Reynolds made this statement to the State Attorney when that official visited him

Thursday in company with Sheriff Morris and County Judge McCrory. Mr. Dymond was arrested and thrown into jail without warrant some days ago. His employer, Mr. H. B. Schulte, and other friends who felt that an injustice had been done the young man, immediately arranged bonds, and Mr. Dymond was released the next morning, his preliminary hearing being set for a future date.

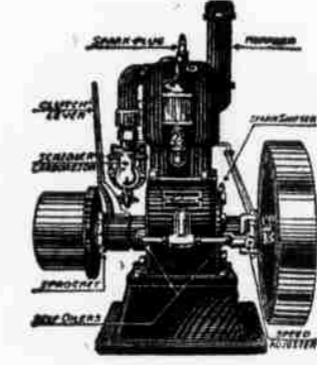
LOSES ARM IN STAVE MILL

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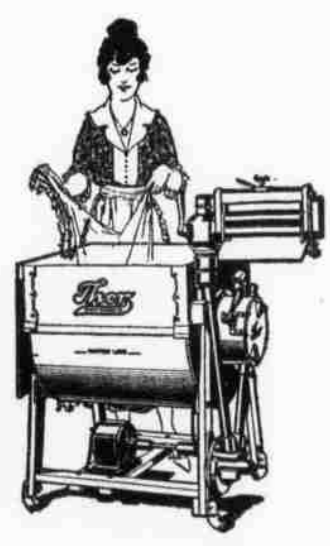
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
