

ALACHUA BEGINS PLAN FOR BUILDING ROADS

Gainesville, July 16.—At a call meeting of the Board of Bond Trustees for Special Road and Bridge District No. 1, of Alachua county, in their rooms at the court house this morning, a resolution was passed hiring H. B. West as engineer for the above named district.

Mr. West was ordered to immediately begin the survey of the road from the Newberry district line, about seven miles west of this city, on in to Gainesville, and from Gainesville through Hawthorne to the Putnam county line, and from this city through Waldo to the Santa Fe river, the Bradford county line.

Immediately after the survey is run Mr. West will estimate the cost of building the road and bids will be advertised for the actual road building. In case the contractors do not bid as low as the Bond Trustees will build the road themselves. Mr. West is also engineer for the State of Florida and all construction work will be done under his personal supervision.

The roads are to be of the following specifications: 60 feet wide, and 16 feet of hard surface. The base will be of limestone rock and later a pebble-granite-asphalt surfacing will be put over it.

Petrograd To Be Saved By Soviet Council of Labor

Reval, Esthonia, July 16.—The Russian Soviet Council of Labor and Defense has taken urgent steps to revive Petrograd, which even the Bolsheviks themselves have recently termed a "dying city."

Thousands of workmen, confronted by starvation, and realizing that Moscow was favored over Petrograd in the matter of food distribution, have recently left the city, with the result that scarcely enough manpower was left to operate what few factories could be provided with fuel.

At a session of the All-Russian Central Executive committee held in Moscow a few days ago it was decided to give Petrograd preferential privileges in regard to fuel and transportation, to place Petrograd in the same situation as Moscow with reference to food supplies, to establish a special district from which food supplies should be drawn solely for the use of Petrograd and to enroll all of Russia to come to the aid of Petrograd in the matter of food and fuel supply. A special commission, headed by Premier Lenine and including Zinovieff, Governor of Petrograd, was named to carry out the work.

It was declared that only one-sixth of the pre-war number of industrial enterprises were in operation in Petrograd. The population is said to number less than 700,000, a little more than a third of the pre-war figures.

The committee also decided to include Petrograd to a greater extent than had been contemplated, in the general electrification scheme.

Kiev Conditions Worst In History War Torn Land

Warsaw, July 16.—Conditions in Kiev, in the Ukraine, are reported worse than at any time since the troubles of Russia began.

Word reached Warsaw recently that the population of the city had dwindled to something like 100,000 persons, whereas at the beginning of the war there were approximately 700,000 inhabitants.

Travelers who have crossed the frontier within the last few weeks, most of them under difficult circumstances, assert that the Bolshevik authorities are again in complete

Profligate Spending In Vienna Startles Even Americans

Vienna, July 16.—The astounding amount of ready money circulating in Austria was illustrated by the recently concluded sale of the rare furnishings of Klessheim-Palace, one of the residences of the Archduke Ludwig Victor. It netted many million crowns and the newspapers say the purchasers were virtually all newly rich Viennese.

Many professional collectors and buyers from France, England and America came here for the sale but declared they could not compete with the native bidders who ran prices up into millions as nonchalantly as if bidding in hundreds. Dollars, pounds and Francs they said were out of the running. Several rare Gobelin's brought from 1,000,000 to 1,500,000 crowns each.

The Vienna Derby just run was another illustration of the money plentitude. About 30,000 persons attended and the receipts of the betting machines alone was 4,500,000 crowns.
