San Juan Schools to Receive a Huge Sum from Taxation

(By Associated Press) San Juan, P. R., July 21—Out of a budget of \$10,000,000 passed by the recent legislature and just approved by Acting Governor Jose Benedicto a little more than \$4,000,000 is set aside for the public schools of the island. This is \$1,000,000 more than the last school budget and the largest amount ever appropriated for education in any one year.

The budget is the largest ever approved. Including bond issues and direct appropriations, the legislature voted expenditures of \$20,000,000 but several of the projects involving large sums may be vetoed by the Governor. Among the bond issues authorized were those for \$3,000,000 for the extending of a railroad around the island; \$1,000,000 for an insular bank; \$2,000,000 road exten-
