Child's Body Is Taken From Lake

Sebring, Fla., Sept. 12—After a 24 hour search in which aeroplanes were used, together with dragnets and grappling hooks, the body of 2 year old Esther Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Smith, was taken out of Lake Jackson late this afternoon. The child fell out of the row boat yesterday afternoon near the center of the lake when two older children of the Smith family accidentally let the boat get away from them and drift out into the water.

DOES AWAY WITH ALL PAIN

Remarkable Anesthetic May Soon Be Employed in Delicate Dental Surgical Operations.

A coal-tar chemical for the elimination of all pain in dental surgical operations, simple of application and suitable for repeated and universal use in oral surgery, according to the Scientific American, is announced by Dr. Joseph A. Klein of New York city. This new chemical is liquid in form, is applied on a pellet of cotton to the gum or mucous membrane surrounding the tooth to be anesthetized or into a cavity prior to excavation where a tooth is to be filled or treated. It produces complete local anesthesia in from two to eight minutes and eliminates all feeling for from one to six hours.

Doctor Klein has extracted teeth and pulps painlessly by the use of this chemical. Its effect is entirely local, so it may be applied with perfect safety, regardless of the patient's age or general physical condition, and it is particularly valuable as an anesthetic in the extraction of children's teeth. It leaves no disagreeable after-effect, but because of its long period of activity gives the nervous system ample time to recover from the shock of operation before the nerves in the area of the operation regain their normal feeling or activity.

ARBUCKLE IN JAIL PENDING - FURTHER PROBE OF MURDER

jury investigation in which Mrs. Belmont was expected to be the leading witness.

Hold Back Star Witness

Mrs. Belmont did not testify at the opening session of the inquest, the district attorney saying that her appearance today, previous to the grand jury session, would handicap the authorities. Instead physicians and others told of Miss Rappe's removal from Arbuckle's suite, her treatment in another hotel room and later at a hospital, her death and the post mortem examination.

The physicians were unable to say what was the exact cause of Miss Rappe's death.

Harry J. Boyle, assistant manager of the hotel, testified that when called by Mrs. Belmont to Arbuckle's suite he found Mrs. Belmont and Al Semmacher sitting on the edge of a bed where Miss Rappe lay moaning and unconscious. Arbuckle picked up Miss Rappe and carried her down the hotel corridor to another room where she stayed until being taken to the hospital three days later, according to Boyle's testimony.

"Too much liquor," was the diagnosis given by Dr. Olav Kearnboe, the first physician called in, according to Kirby's own statement. At that time there was no evidence of serious injury, he said. Dr. M. E. Rumwell, testified Miss Rappe's condition did not seem serious until Thursday of last week when a consultation was held.

Dr. Rumwell said there was nothing to indicate she had suffered from any violence until the post mortem examination when he said evidence of internal injuries were found.

Another physician called to perform the post mortem operation described the internal injuries but said he could not say definitely what caused them.
