Rotary to Have a Part in Paying a Tribute to Soldier

Chicago, Nov. 8.—Rotary is to have a prominent part in the ceremonies incident to the burial of the "Unknown American Soldier," Armistice Day.

Past International President John Poole, and Ed L. Stock, of Washington, D. C., and governor of the Fifth Rotary District, have been formally named to represent International Rotary on this occasion.

Inasmuch as the number of seats in the Amphitheater where the ceremony is to take place is very limited, it will not be possible to accommodate anywhere near the crowd that will attend when the whole United States and the many representatives of foreign governments will pay tribute to America's unknown dead of the world war.

At the time of the International Rotary Convention in Edinburgh, Scotland, last summer, the Rotarian delegates from all over the world paid tribute to the unknown soldiers of Britain and France.
