GEORGE EVERTON WILL BE RER CROSS CHAIRMAN
Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 8.—The acceptance of the appointment as Roll Call chairman for Palatka of Geor. B. Everson, has been received at headquarters of the Southern Division of the American Red Cross. Mr. Everson will immediately begin active work of organization to make the Roll Call the most far-reaching in the history of Palatka.
Increased and extended activities of the Red Cross make this appointment one of tremendous importance this year.
Activities of the Red Cross are so extensively enlarged that a maximum membership must be obtained in order that the growing demands made on the organization may be met.
The work of the Red Cross for disabled veterans of the world war and members of their families has reached absolutely staggering proportions. The numbers of soldiers in hospitals under government care has grown from 3,300 in 1919 to 25,000 in 1921 and the new year is expected to see this number increased in even greater proportion.

Reports were made by those attending the All Florida Rotary day at Orlando, the business sessions held being described as highly satisfactory. Each visiting Rotarian was assessed \$5 to help pay the expenses of the meeting. It was reported that there was practically no enthusiasm over this feature.
Plans were launched for the annual meeting and banquet, which will be open to invited friends of the Club. A special program of stunts and oratory will be arranged. At this meeting officers will also be elected. It will be held in February.
