Crescent City's New Bank Will Open Thursday

Crescent City, Jan. 11.—The recently organized Peoples Bank of Crescent City held its first annual meeting ...

Later in the day the newly elected board of directors met and elected the following officers: President, Dr. A. B. Harbison; vice presidents, Col. R. S. Rheinhardt and Senator W. A. Russell; secretary and cashier, W. A. Warner. Announcements being sent out by this bank state that the stockholders comprise upwards of fifty citizens and winter residents whose financial rating and worth is over three million dollars, a figure which, it may be added, is considerably lower than the actual rating. It is announced that the bank will be open for business January 12, in its temporary quarters.

FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF PALM BEACH CHANGES HANDS (By Associated Press) West Palm Beach, Jan. 11.—The First National bank, one of the largest and oldest financial institutions in this section of the state, has passed from the control of the men who have had it for the past several years and as a result many changes have been made in its executive personnel.

The change was brought about by the acquisition by Messrs. W. W. Banks, vice president of the Citizens and Southern bank of Atlanta; J. L. Griffin, H. L. Donald, E. M. Brelsford, George N. Hatch and J. R. Anthony, of the holdings of George W. Potter, formerly chairman of the board of directors; B. A. Maxfield, former president, and E. C. Rumsey, former cashier, and L. S. Watkins, former director in the bank.

J. L. Griffin succeeds Mr. Maxwell as president of the bank, and H. L. Donald, formerly connected with the institution as cashier, returns to that position as a successor to Mr. Rumsey.

BIRMINGHAM POLICE SEEK WIELDER OF MURDEROUS AX (By Associated Press) Birmingham, Ala., Jan. 11.—Police were baffled today in the search for an ax-wielder, who last night slew Mrs. G. S. Crawford, wife of a grocer and inflicted injuries upon her husband, whose condition is reported critical.

Evidence at hand points to robbery as the motive for the crime, authorities said. The woman was slain in the Crawford shop, which adjoined the residence. A 2-year-old child was unharmed.

France, finally renounced any part of the 1,000,000,000 marks already paid, will get 1,125,000,000 marks of the payments in kind each year, the remainder going as follows: 240,000,000 to Italy; 100,000,000 to Great Britain; 125,000,000 to Belgium; 7,000,000 to Japan and the rest to other beneficiaries under the treaty.

Cannes, Jan. 11.—The British memorandum of the proposed Anglo-French pact which was telegraphed textually to London declares that Great Britain makes the security of France a problem of her own and that she will be ready again to throw her forces into the fray as in 1914 if France is again attacked.

Germany Asked to Explain. Cannes, Jan. 11.—Representatives of the German government were summoned to appear this evening before the allied reparations commission to explain Germany's inability to meet her January and February reparations payments.
