Many citrus growers take precautions against insects and diseases and then permit careless handling in picking and packing. Experiments carried out by the United States Department of Agriculture show that fruit more than 95 per cent of the decay of fruits after they reach market is due to fungi induced by mechanical injury. Blue mold decay and other injuries. Blue mold decay and other injuries are harbored by the cuts or abrasions on the skins.

These sometimes develop so extensively as to demoralize the market. The direct loss of fruit through decay leads to depreciation of prices for fruit actually sound, and to a reputation for poor keeping qualities and to a proportionately high overhead expense for handling a perishable product which develops waste and spoilage during transit and after it reaches the market.

H. E. Stevens, plant pathologist to the University of Florida Experiment Station, calls attention to a recent statement sent out by the Department concerning the handling of fruit.

According to reports from investigations injuries result from clipper cuts, leaving sharp stems which wound other fruits, thorn punctures, and bruises. Bruises result from dropping fruits into the boxes or into the picking bags and baskets, or from careless handling in the packing house. Sand, gravel, splinters or protruding nails in containers or hauling over rough may cause additional injuries.—Agricultural News Service.

Spraying for San Jose Scale in December. Spraying for San Jose Scale should be done when the trees are dormant. Since peach trees reach this stage in December, that is the best month for fighting this pest.

J. R. Watson, entomologist to the University of Florida Experiment Station, recommends spraying with lime sulfur, 1 part of the commercial solution to 9 parts of water.

Spraying must be done after the old leaves have fallen and before the new buds begin to swell to avoid injury to foliage. While December is the time recommended, late varieties might be sprayed safely in January, but the early varieties probably will be resuming growth by that time.

Scale fungus can be introduced in June next year to take care of the summer brood.

It will be 50 per cent greater than that in 1915 and double that of the preceding year.
