PONCE DE LEON'S COMING.

Preparations for the Ponce de Leon celebration at St. Augustine this year are progressing upon the usual elaborate scale. The historical pageants at the fort reservation on the mornings of March 30 and 31, and April 1, consisting of the brilliant tableaux representing the landing of Ponce de Leon, the arrival and founding of the city by Mendez, and the change of flags, will be wonderful spectacular events. These will be followed by gorgeous street parades.

The afternoons will be devoted to sports, such as speed boat regattas on the bay, and base ball and field sports on the Y. M. C. A. grounds. Each night there will be band concerts in the brightly illuminated plaza, and thrilling spectacles on the fort reservation, including an Indian attack upon a stage coach, escape of Oseola and attack upon the fort, an elaborate pyrotechnic display, with other stirring and interesting features.

The elaborate historical ball, attended by Ponce de Leon and his glittering retinue, will take place in the Casino on the night of March 31st.

Visitors in the state, as well as citizens of Florida, should make plans to attend. The railroad has made special rates for the occasion. Write to the hotels for accommodation as St. Augustine will entertain thousands during Ponce de Leon week.

POINTS ON THE PRIMARY LAWS.
Attorney General Park Trammell has prepared a brief synopsis on certain parts of the present laws governing primary elections and which will clear away any confusion in the minds of voters and candidates, and which the News takes pleasure in publishing for their benefit. Mr. Trammell's synopsis is as follows:

Wife's Qualification.
Those who are registered and who pay their poll tax due for 1918 and 1919, or before April 9th, 1919, will be qualified to vote at the approaching primary, as well as those who were not subject to poll tax on account of age or non-residence.

Poll Tax.
Poll tax has to be paid by the person who owns it, except it may be paid by another if a real or personal property tax is also paid for the person against whom the poll tax is assessed.

The person owing the poll tax can pay it without paying his real or personal property tax. The Tax Collector is the judge as to who is paying the poll tax. If he is satisfied that it is being paid according to law and by the person who owes it, and is willing to accept a payment that is transmitted through the mail, it may be so transmitted by the person owing the poll tax. This, however, will depend upon the ruling of the Tax Collector for his own protection. The law imposes a penalty against any person who pays the poll tax for another, but it does not punish for the payment of the poll tax of another, except as above provided.

Bribery.
Any person who shall give, lend, solicit, request, demand or receive directly or indirectly any money or anything else of value, or the promise thereof, or influence a vote or count of a vote, or be used to influence a vote, or on the day of the primary, for or against any candidate, shall be guilty of bribery and subject to not more than ten years or less than one year's imprisonment.

Candidate's Statement.
All county candidates shall file with the Clerk of the Circuit Court, and all State candidates with the Secretary of State, at least ten days before the primary, a complete itemized statement of his campaign expenses and all contributions made to his campaign fund. A similar statement shall also be made and filed within ten days after the primary. These must be sworn to.

Campaign Contributions.
Contributions by any corporation directly or indirectly to the campaign fund of any candidate, or to support of or in furtherance of his candidacy, is prohibited under a penalty of a forfeiture of license under a fine of not less than \$1,000, nor more than \$10,000, or imprisonment for not less than two years or more than five years.

Registration.
The registration books shall be open in each election district for four weeks in all counties, and shall be closed in counties with thirty thousand population or more four weeks before the primary, in other counties shall be closed two weeks before the primary. The date of the primary being May 16, 1919.
