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How Palatka Grows.

Postmaster D. M. Kirby, who has just closed another official year in the Palatka postoffice, and his twelfth year as postmaster in this city, furnishes some information in his annual report that ought to prove encouraging to every Palatka...

The receipts of the postoffice for the quarter ending March 31st, 1910, were \$4,023.00—the biggest business in the history of the Palatka postoffice.

The total receipts for the year ending March 31st, 1910, were \$14,300—double the receipts of 12 years ago.

The receipts of the office for the first year of Mr. Kirby's incumbency—12 years ago—were a little more than \$7,000.

The postmaster is very proud of these figures, as he has a right to be. They indicate, fully and possibly better than anything else could, the steady growth of Palatka.

Mr. Kirby hasn't said it in so many words, but knowing the man and his love of neatness and orderliness in business methods and his appreciation of suitable surroundings in which to do business, it is fair to presume he feels keenly the need of a better, more suitable postoffice building.

The increased business demands better quarters—something in keeping with the spirit of progress which now dominates the business men of Palatka.

Mr. Kirby's long, efficient and faithful service for the government has earned him a better, larger, modern equipped office in which to transact business, as well as would afford better accommodations for the public.

Last Friday the domestic science department of the Woman's Club, under the chairmanship of Mrs. J. H. Hubbard held a very interesting meeting in the club rooms.

The board of trustees for Putnam county bonds, while in session on Wednesday awarded the contract for constructing the new hard road from Francis to Keuka to Mr. J. H. Wylie of Interlachen.

All the bids for constructing the road from Francis to Keuka were rejected, and the county engineer instructed to advertise for new bids.

The annual city election took place on Tuesday, the entire city ticket headed by Howell A. Davis for mayor being elected without opposition.

The new aldermen are: Benj. J. Gay (re-nominated), Judge V. Walton, D. J. Coughlin, A. Usina (re-nominated), L. A. Smith, Tom Holden, D. A. Mullis and Joe Adams (re-nominated).

Points Regarding the Census.

B. B. Dancy Jr. of Orange Mills and E. T. Holmes of this city have been appointed census enumerators for the city of Palatka, the former to take the census among the white people, and the latter among the colored.

The census begins April 15 and must be completed in two weeks in cities and in thirty days in all other areas.

The enumerators will wear a badge inscribed "United States Census, 1910."

The law requires every adult person to furnish the prescribed information, but also provides that it shall be treated confidentially, so that no injury can come to any person from answering the questions.

The President has issued a proclamation, calling on all citizens to cooperate with the census and assuring them that it has nothing to do with taxation, army or jury service, compulsory school attendance, regulation of immigration, or enforcement of any law, and that no one can be injured by answering the inquiries.

It is of the utmost importance that the census of population and agriculture in this state be complete and correct.

Therefore every person should promptly, accurately, and completely answer the census questions asked by the enumerators.
