GOVERNORS OF MANY STATES IN LINE FOR TEDDY

Protest Use of Organized Political Machinery Based On Patronage.

EIGHT GOVERNORS AND DELEGATES FROM TWENTY-EIGHT STATES MEET AND ORGANIZE PERMANENT COMMITTEE TO PUSH CANDIDACY OF ROOSEVELT FOR THE REPUBLICAN PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATION.

By Associated Press. Chicago, Feb. 10.—Eight governors and delegates from twenty-eight states met here today at an informal conference and organized a permanent committee to push the candidacy of Theodore Roosevelt for president.

Delegates of the conference told of the work already done toward promoting the former president's candidacy. The meeting was without a dissent and the resolutions adopted declared "that all are agreed that Theodore Roosevelt is the one man who can at this time unite all elements of the party and attract a large number of independent voters."

They conclude with a protest against the use of organized political machinery based on patronage to deprive the people of any voice as to their real choice.

The suggestion that a Roosevelt enthusiasm convention be held in some central city, probably Cincinnati, prior to the Republican national convention was referred to the executive committee.

In a statement eulogizing Roosevelt and urging him to be a candidate, the names of the following eight governors were attached: Stubbs of Kansas, Osborn of Michigan, Hadley of Missouri, Almon of Nebraska, Beasly of New Hampshire, Glasscock of West Virginia, Vessey of South Dakota, and Carr of Wyoming.

FLORIDA LAND INVESTIGATION IN FULL BLAST

Solicitor McCabe of Agricultural Department the First Witness.

THE WITNESS AND SENATOR FLETCHER THROW SOME LIGHT ON THE EVERGLADES LAND SCANDAL AND SUPPRESSION OF REPORTS—M'CABE ADMITS CHARGES AGAINST MEN WERE BROUGHT BY A SUBORDINATE.

Washington, Feb. 10.—George P. McCabe, solicitor of the department of agriculture, appeared before the house committee on expenditures in that department today to outline the attitude of Secretary Wilson and himself with relation to Florida Everglades land cases, the charges of suppressed reports made by Representatives Clark and Bathrick and the discharge of Chief Drainage Engineer C. G. Elliott and his assistant, A. A. Morehouse.

FLOODS CONTINUE IN EVERY PART OF PORTUGAL Lisbon, Feb. 10.—Floods continue in every part of Portugal, but the southern districts are most seriously affected. Distress among the population is acute.

At Oporto, a large number of barges on the river Douro have been swept away and several small coasting vessels have been driven out to sea and lost.

At the port of Leixoes, the damage done by the inundations on the water front is estimated at over \$1,000,000.

18TH CAVALRY IS ORDERED TO EL PASO, TEX.

SITUATION AT JUAREZ, OPPOSITE THE PLACE OF MOBILIZATION, IS SUCH AS TO DEMAND PRESENCE OF ADDITIONAL TROOPS TO LOOK AFTER INTERESTS OF AMERICANS.

Washington, Feb. 10.—A battalion of the 18th cavalry has been ordered from Whipple Barracks, Arizona, to El Paso, Texas. The situation at Juarez, opposite El Paso, is reported to be very serious, the insurgents being much disturbed over the prospective entry of Madero troops into that place by way of American territory.

When the first request of the Mexican government was granted by the state department it was understood that only about 400 men were involved and these only for garrisoning the post at Juarez. Later much uneasiness was expressed by Texans who feared that Mexico was going to use the American route for a general mobilization of troops to suppress outbreaks in Chihuahua. Upon representations from the governor of Texas the first permission was held up.

Discussions are now going on between the American embassy at Mexico and the Madero government to make it clear that the American state department granted permission only for the small garrison to go to Juarez. When the understanding is clear, the soldiers will undoubtedly pass through under escort of American cavalry.

NATIONAL CONGRESS OF MOTHERS IS TO MEET Philadelphia, Feb. 10.—Announcement was made today by Mrs. Frederic Schoff, president of the National Congress of Mothers, that the executive committee of the organization has selected St. Louis as the place for holding the next congress. The meeting will open on March 20 and close March 24.

ALLEGED PRESIDENT TAFT ORDERED CHARGES AGAINST ARMY OFFICER SUPPRESSED

Washington, Feb. 10.—That charges of conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman against Major Beecher B. Ray, of the army pay corps, were suppressed at the suggestion of President Taft, was the declaration made before the house committee on expenditures in the war department by Brigadier General C. H. Whipple, retiring paymaster general of the army.

SEN. STEPHENSON IS EXONERATED Vote Was 8 to 5, Senator Fletcher of Florida, Voting to Exonerate Him of Charge of Corruption.

Washington, Feb. 10.—By a vote of 8 to 5 the senate committee on privileges and elections today approved the report of the sub-committee, exonerating Senator Stephenson of charges of corruption in connection with his election.

LIQUOR CAUSES A STIR IN ALABAMA Harry Kahn, Jacksonville Dealer, Arrested in Montgomery and Governor is Considering Removing Officers.

Montgomery, Ala., Feb. 10.—On arriving in Montgomery this morning, Harry Kahn, a local wholesale liquor dealer, furnished bond of \$1,000 for his appearance at Gothen, Pike county, February 15 to answer to a charge of attempted bribery of Excise Commissioner J. E. Furlow of Gothen. The only statement of Mr. Kahn was to denounce the charge as untrue.

COLD WEATHER HOLDS SWAY IN EVERY SECTION

AT SOME POINTS IN THE EAST IT IS 41 DEGREES BELOW ZERO AND A FOOD AND FUEL FAMINE IS FEARED—THE COLD WAVE TRAVELS SOUTH IN A VERY RAPID MANNER.

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—Bitter cold weather with the temperature falling ten degrees below zero, held sway in the eastern section of the country today. Today and tonight the records of the weather bureau in some sections, notably in northern New York, where 41 below was reported at one point in the Adirondack region.

AT CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Feb. 10.—Ten inches of snow fell here in twelve hours today and tonight.

AT PITTSBURGH, Pa., Feb. 10.—The coldest weather of the winter struck Pittsburgh this morning, the official temperature being 5 below zero.

AT CHICAGO, Ill., Feb. 10.—The temperature has hovered around zero during the last twenty-four hours, but according to the weather bureau warmer weather is due. Records completed today show that January 1913 was the coldest Chicago has experienced in thirty-five years.

TO REMOVE OLD BUILDING AND ERECT NEW ONE

London, Feb. 10.—Earnest Tehr Hooley, who was one of the leading men in the financial world of London a few years ago, was sentenced today at the Old Bailey to a year's imprisonment on a charge of obtaining money by fraudulently representing some property he had sold to the prosecutor as free of encumbrances.

FLEET OF REBEL WARSHIPS SIGHTED Imperial Troops at Shan Hai Kwan Prepare to Resist the Landing of Revolutionists.

London, Feb. 10.—A fleet of revolutionary warships were sighted off the port of Shan Hai Kwan, on the railway line from Peking, this morning, according to a news agency dispatch received here from Tientsin. Urgent orders have been issued by the commanders of the imperial troops to prepare all available transports in order to resist the landing of the rebel forces.
