UNIVERSITY NOTES.

Special to The Journal. Gainesville, Feb. 27.—The University is looking forward with pleasurable anticipation to the approaching visit of Judge Thomas M. Shackelford, of the supreme court of the state. On his previous visits the judge has delivered series of lectures before the law students, as well as before the general student body which would have attracted attention at any university in the country. His lectures on Pragmatism were very scholarly and were couched in excellent English. They probably marked a turning point in the intellectual life of many of the students. During his visit this year his lectures will be mainly for the students in the college of law. A little later in the session, Chief Justice Whitfield and Judge Hoeker will visit the university and lecture to the law students. The university recognizes the great good that accrues because of the interest shown by these great leaders of the bar, and is grateful. On Friday, Feb. 23, Dr. E. R. Flint delivered at Epworth Hall a charming lecture, illustrated with many beautiful slides, on "Panama." This was the third of the series of university extension lectures to be given in Gainesville this semester. Interest in these lectures is great, and all the lecturers have large audiences. The next lecture will be by Dr. Benton, on "Astronomy." At the next meeting of the Athenaeum club Prof. Collison will read a paper on "The Commission Form of Government." The three months course for teachers began on Monday, Feb. 19, and has already enrolled a goodly number of teachers and would be teachers. It is not too late to enter now. Other departments of the university are also enrolling new students. Among the latest to register are Professors L. W. Black and H. K. Coleman, both of whom are studying law. The former is originally from Indiana, but has been a school principal in Florida for the past three years. The latter was until recently supervising principal of the city schools of Tampa. Dr. John A. Thackston, state inspector of high schools, left on Feb. 24th for St. Louis, where he will attend a meeting of the department of school supervision of the National Educational Association. New life has been infused into the student monthly. Prizes for the best essay, the best short story, the best poem, and the best joke have been offered, and a large number of students will compete.
