For the purpose of electing a president to succeed John E. Stillman, resigned, a meeting of the board of directors of the Pensacola Interstate Fair Association will be held this morning at 10 o'clock in the offices of General Manager Lillard, 508-9 Blount building.

Another important matter to come before the board will be the selection of a manager for the woman's department of the fair for this year. A lady has already been selected for this position by the secretary and general manager and the board will be asked to approve the selection at the session this morning. Mr. Lillard will not make the name of the lady public until the board has approved his selection, but as soon as this is done she will take charge of the work in that department and begin making arrangements for the fair this fall.

It is also probable that a number of other very important matters will be taken up by the board at this time and General Manager Lillard urges every member to make an effort to attend the meeting and take part in the important matter of selecting a man to fill the responsible position made vacant by the resignation of Mr. Stillman.

Mr. Lillard is especially desirous of getting this important detail selected so that he can go ahead with the fair work, which has necessarily been somewhat held up awaiting the election of a president of the association.

**MOVING NAVY YARD SUPPLIES TO CHARLESTON**

THE COLLIER STARLING IS TAKING A FULL CARGO AND ALL THAT IS LEFT WILL BE SOLD AT PUBLIC AUCTION FRIDAY MORNING.

What is left of the supplies and material from the Pensacola navy yard, which is not carried off by the collier Starling, now loading there, will be sold at public auction Friday morning by Paymaster Lamar, who is here from Charleston looking after the work of completing the transfer of stores. Of course the machinery in all departments will remain just as it was when the yard closed down.

The Starling has been loading for several days and has practically completed her cargo. This consists of building material, metal furniture from all of the quarters, about twenty tons of iron launches, the smallest dinghies, and other equipment that can be used at Charleston.

Friday morning Lieut. Lamar will sell what is left at auction. This will include a locomotive, several flat cars, scrap iron and copper, a horse, vehicles and material which cannot be profitably moved.

**MAN OVER 100 YEARS OLD DEAD**

Robert Duggins, the oldest negro living on the reservation at Warrington, and one of the oldest residents of this section, passed away Monday afternoon and his funeral occurred yesterday afternoon.

It is claimed that "Uncle Robert," as he was generally known to both white and black people of the Warrington community, was more than a hundred years old. He had resided at Warrington since 1840, having been taken there as a slave by his former master, Bud Williams. At this time there was only one house at what is now Warrington. He helped to build Forts Barrancas, Pickens and McRae, as well as the light house.

He was always regarded as a submissive and faithful servant and went clear through the civil war with his master, serving as a cook. From the time he came to Warrington to the time of his death he always enjoyed the respect and confidence of the white people of the community and of his own race.
