SOLDIERS NOW BEING DRILLED FOR SERVICE

BIG GUNS ARE PUT OUT OF COMMISSION, INDICATING THERE WILL BE NO MORE PRACTICE WITH THEM FOR SOME TIME—THOUGHT IT IS PREPARATIONS TO MOVE TO THE BORDER.

Artillery pieces at Forts Pickens and McRae during the last few days have been put out of commission and greased with axle grease and the soldiers at the forts are being drilled in infantry maneuvers, three or four hours each day.
No reason for the drills and preparing the artillery is given out, but it is generally considered at the forts and in Pensacola that the officers have been ordered to have the men in fit condition to be put into service without delay should it become necessary to order troops to Mexico to protect human life and loss of property.
It is generally thought here that within a few days the orders will come for the troops to move to the Mexican border and probably on to Mexico City, so alarming have conditions become in the republic south of the Rio Grande.
Last spring the Pensacola troops were ordered to the border and there was a bit of excitement the morning they departed. It is understood that should the troops be ordered to Mexico that very few of them will go by rail and that transports will convey them from Pensacola to some Mexican point.
