A UNIQUE TRANSFER

Of Property, Amounting to 2,560 Acres.

(From Friday's Daily.)

At the morning session yesterday of the Florida Association of Title Men a very interesting and unique paper was read by Mr. H. E. Anschutz. It was a deed for a certain piece of land in Sullivan county, Pennsylvania, and conveyed the title of the land to Almighty God. Mr. Anschutz came across this deed in 1890, when he was assistant engineer on a new railroad building in Sullivan county, and had an old friend send him an authenticated copy from the deed books in the recorder's office.

The following is an exact copy, and the two misspelled words are accurate copies of the original: This indenture made the Fourteenth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

Peter E. Armstrong and wife to Almighty God.

Know all men by these presents—That I, Peter E. Armstrong and Hannah my wife, of the County of Sullivan, and State of Pennsylvania, having redeemed from the inhabitants of Earth by lawful purchase, a certain tract of land within the boundaries herein described and being fully impressed and taught by the Inspired Word of God and His Holy Spirit, that His children should not claim to own property of any kind as individuals, but that they should render and consecrate unto God all things they possess for the common good of His people who are waiting for His Son from Heaven and who are willing to live together in Holy fellowship, relying upon His word and bounty; and to the end that His saints may be fully separated from the world, and gather together and enjoy that light and liberty which they did in the once faithful days of their Theocracy; We do make and establish this Deed of Conveyance this fourteenth day of June, in the Year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

Whereas, in consideration of the kind, protecting care of Almighty God in the past and present, which we do hereby humbly acknowledge, and for the exceeding great and precious promise of sending life to those who in Holy faith and patient wait for the coming of His anointed Son to judge the world; which promises we have received from Him who is Creator and original Grantor of Earth's Territory to the children of men; we do, by these presents, deed, grant and convey to Almighty God, who inhabits Eternity, and to His heirs in Jesus Messiah, to the intent that it shall be subjected to bargain and sale by man's cupidity no more forever, all our right and title (by human law) interest and claim of any nature soever in or to that certain tract of land and improvements thereof, lying and being in the County of Sullivan and State of Pennsylvania, being our part of a partial of land within the following bounds:

Beginning at a point in the wilderness; three hundred and twenty rods due South of the South-west corner of the town plot of Celestia (as recorded in Deed Book No. 2, page 266, in the office for the recording of deeds, in and for the County of Sullivan); and running due West three hundred and twenty perches to a corner; thence due North, six hundred and forty rods to a corner; thence due east, six hundred and forty rods to a corner; thence due south, six hundred and forty rods to a corner; thence due west, three hundred and twenty rods to the place of beginning. Containing four square miles of land, of which we have redeemed about six hundred acres, and we do hereby set

apart by boundary with intent to redeem the balance of said tract at or before the redemption of the whole world, as the purchased possession of Jesus Messiah.

Together with all and singular the rights, liberties, privileges and appurtenances whatsoever thereunto belonging to us; we do grant, deed and convey to the said Creator and God of Heaven and Earth and to His heirs in Jesus Messiah for their proper use and behoove forever.

In witness whereof, we have hereunto set our hands and seal the day and year above written.

PETER E. ARMSTRONG, (L.S.) HANNAH ARMSTRONG, (L.S.) Sullivan County, ss:

Before me, a Justice of the Peace, in and for the County of Sullivan, personally came Peter E. Armstrong and Hannah, his wife, and in due form of law acknowledged the foregoing deed to be his free act and desired the same might be recorded as such according to law; she, the said Hannah, also well knowing the contents thereof, voluntarily consenting thereto on my examination, separate from her said husband.

Witness my hand and seal this 14th day of June, A. D. 1864.

ST. EDMUND'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

The services held Sunday at St. Edmund's Episcopal church were beautiful and solemn in their character. Rt. Rev. Cameron Mann, bishop of South Florida, was here to confirm a class of young people.

At the early service holy communion was given by the bishop, assisted by the rector. At the close of the Sunday school service Allen and Crockett Dowd and Bertie Maybelle Saunders were baptized by the rector, Rev. F. A. Shore.

The church was filled at the 11 o'clock service, when the bishop delivered a masterful and forcible address from the text, "Lord, are there few that be saved?" from St. Luke 13:23. This sermon was full of strong lessons, and left many thoughts to be pondered over. At the conclusion of the sermon a class of ten was presented by the rector, and Bishop Mann delivered the rite of confirmation as they knelt before the altar, afterwards delivering a message of good thoughts to the class. A large number of communicants were then given holy communion by the bishop, assisted by Mr. Shore.

At the evening service, the church was again filled to its capacity, and the people had the pleasure of again hearing Bishop Mann in a wonderful, interesting and eloquent discourse. During the time he was talking, his hearers gave him the closest attention, and many lasting lessons were left in the minds of those present. The text was taken from St. John 20:6, 7, 8: "Then cometh Simon Peter following him, and went into the sepulchre, and seeth the linen clothes lie, and the napkin that was about his head, not lying with the linen clothes, but wrapped together in a place by itself. Then went in also that other disciple, which came first to the sepulchre, and he saw and believed." In the course of his address the bishop spoke of this being really the close of the Easter season, next Thursday being Ascension day. He told of the wonder of the disciples at finding the tomb empty, the clothes lying so neatly folded. There were three things that could have entered their minds in reference to the disappearance of the body. One was that it might have been stolen by His enemies, but in that case it would have been taken with the grave clothes. Another was that His friends might have taken it away to some other burial place, in order to keep the body from those who were enemies. But at last the thought came, could this indeed be the resurrection? Then came the appearance of Jesus to the women and to the disciples, not as they had expected to find Him, in the bodily form as

he had been laid in the tomb, but in His spiritual being. He spoke also of other apparent resurrections, but which were not the real resurrection. The son of the widow of Nain, the daughter of Jairus, and Lazarus were raised from the dead, and came back to their mortal bodies, only later on to really die and their dust mingle with the earth where they were laid. This resurrection of Jesus was the one and only resurrection. The sermon was full of thought for one and all, and was enjoyed by the many present.

The church was beautiful in its decoration of white flowers on the altar, while other flowers adorned the organ and baptismal font. At both services fine music was rendered by the choir, and at the evening service, during the offertory, Miss Ella Polk sang "Calvary" in a most effective manner.

WIFE OF DR. J. L. KELLY DIES AT GAINESVILLE.

Prof. George M. Lynch, principal of the DeSoto County High School, received a telegram late yesterday afternoon announcing the sad death of the wife of Dr. J. L. Kelly, candidate for the democratic nomination for state superintendent of public instruction.

Mrs. Kelley was taken quite sick last Tuesday while the doctor was campaigning in the western part of the state. He immediately returned to Gainesville, to be with her, and she became so much better that her son left for Jacksonville Thursday, on matters of business. Mrs. Kelley, however, took a relapse and died Friday morning.

Mrs. Kelley was a woman much beloved by all who knew her. She was a member of the famous Windsor family, of Virginia, was highly educated, being a regular contributor to several magazines of national reputation.

Her death came as a shock to the many friends of Dr. Kelly in this part of the state, and he has their sincerest sympathy in this his greatest of all bereavements.

BIG JUDGMENT HAS BEEN SET ASIDE.

Word has been received in this city that the judgment awarded Francis L. Chaplin and Robert J. Edwards as executors and trustees of Jacob Edwards, deceased, in their suit against the Florida Commercial Company, has been set aside, and a new trial granted by Judge Perkins, judge of the tenth judicial circuit court of the state of Florida. This case was heard before Judge Perkins in this city during the last fall term of the tenth judicial circuit court, and in that trial a judgment for \$134,783.79 as principal was

found for the plaintiffs, but at that time Judge Perkins granted the attorneys for the defendant a hearing on why they should have a new trial. The attorneys for the plaintiffs are Judge A. F. Odlin, of this city, and Judge Pettigill, of Tampa, and the attorneys for the defendants are Treadwell & Treadwell, of this city, and Sparkman & Carter, of Tampa.

JUDGE A. F. ODLIN'S SON Has Been Assigned to the Navy Yard and Aviation Station at Pensacola.

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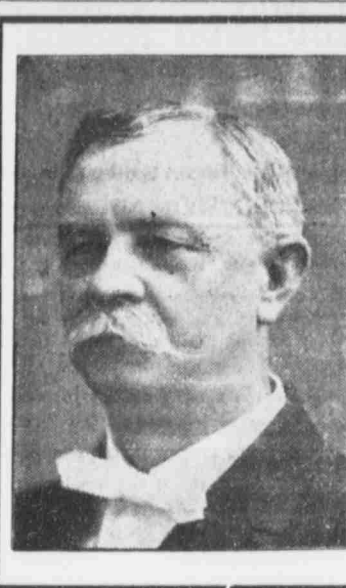
