Women Doing Great Work In Liberty Loan Campaign

Atlanta, Ga., April 16.—The patriotism of the women of America has never been so emphatically demonstrated as in the Third Liberty Loan campaign. Reports from the women's organizations from all parts of the Sixth Federal District, show that tremendous results are being accomplished by the women's committees, apart from the work that is being done the men.

Mrs. Haynes McFadden, chairman of the woman's committee for the Sixth District, is in receipt of a continuous stream of reports from the many local committees throughout the district in which large sales are reported and the utmost activity is being manifested.

From Athens, Ga., where Mrs. George Mell is chairman, the women have already taken subscriptions for \$30,000; with the intensive drive which has been planned still a week off. In this drive, six teams will be used, and the town will be thoroughly canvassed.

The Putnam County, Georgia, committee, through its chairman, Mrs. V. H. Tallafiero, of Eatonton, reports \$27,250 in three days' work. Mrs. Inez Wilkins Jones, chairman for Burke County, Georgia, wires that her committee has accounted for \$60,000 so far.

Mrs. Z. I. Fitzpatrick, temporary chairman for Georgia who had addressed a Liberty Loan rally in Savannah with excellent results, states that the Georgia Society of Colonial Dames, of which Mrs. W. L. Wilson is president, voted at its last meeting to invest \$2,000 of its funds in bonds.

Atlanta, Ga., April 16.—Throughout the entire Southeastern division of railroads, a systematic campaign has been inaugurated to have all railway officials and employees subscribe to the Third Liberty Loan.

Acting under orders from C. H. Markham, Regional Director for the southeast, all systems in this division have been organized for the Bond Campaign, and it is the intention of those in charge of this work to see to it that every railway man in the service is given a full opportunity to enter his subscriptions for as many bonds as he is able to handle.

Mr. Markham has appointed a regional committee to have general oversight of this work and to see that all lines and divisions are properly lined up for the campaign. E. T. Lamb, president of the A. B. & A., is chairman of this committee; and associated with him are H. W. Miller, vice president of the Southern; C. A. Wickersham, president of the A. & W. P.; and W. L. Stanley, assistant to the president of the Seaboard.

The full purpose of this committee, as outlined in Mr. Markham's general order covering it, is to promote the sale of Liberty Bonds, to railway officials and employees; to work in conjunction with the railroads and assist in bringing about co-operation between the railroads and the Federal Reserve Bank, state, county and city organizations to co-ordinate the work of the campaign in every way.

There has already been a wide response from the railway employees of the Sixth Federal Reserve District. They have shown themselves highly patriotic on every occasion that an appeal has been made. With the present organization beginning an active and intensive campaign, it is expected to bring about a still greater response from officials and employees alike.

Each railway system is being organized along similar lines. A special committee is appointed for the system, and these in turn appoint division committees, and so on down the line. Practically all committees have been appointed and they are getting down to work.

WONDERFUL ACHIEVEMENT

If there be truth in the rumor that an airplane carrying twelve passengers has made a flight straight across the Atlantic to England it is a wonderful achievement. While the rumor has not been verified there is no reason why it may not be true. The accomplishment of such a feat is possible. It is ever more reasonable to believe it than believe a big gun could fire a projectile a distance of 74 miles. It would seem to be only a question of making an airplane big enough and powerful enough to make the flight, and if this has been done a step in advance has been made.

WOMEN SUCCESSFUL AS FARM WORKERS

That the employment of women in farm work has proved a success was the statement of Mrs. Laura Crane Burgess, speaking at a meeting of the Committee on Food Production of the Woman's Division of the District Council of National Defense called to establish in Washington a district unit of the Woman's Land Army of America.

Mrs. Burgess told of the experiment at the camp in Bedford, Westchester. The women volunteers lived in tents and, under the direction of a supervisor, went out to work at the request of the farmers. The demand for their labor proved to be far in excess of the supply. The fact that the farmers were not required to pay for their help in bad weather or drought, and the further fact that the women were not quartered on the farms to increase the labor of the already overworked farmers' wives, were important elements in the success of the plan. "The Bedford experiment has shown," Mrs. Burgess said, "that women can satisfactorily do all kind of general farming with very little supervision, while the labor of girls and boys requires so much supervision that 90 per cent of the farmers of New York State have declared against their employment."

Twenty States, according to Mrs. Burgess, are either organized or in the process of organization for the formation of woman farmer units. The division is by counties, but the labor shortage is the controlling element in the placement of camps. Gen. Goethals, on the request of the Woman's Land Army, has written to Gen. McArthur, asking him to put aside all condemned Army equipment to be purchased at a low rate by the Woman's Land Army of America.
