Florida--The Land of Perpetual Farming

these are the most important or at least the largest shippers.

The yields for the last three years have been as follows: 1916. 927,591 crates; 1917. 998,250 crates; 1918. 1,115,000 crates.

CUCUMBERS
This is a crop that was once grown mostly in one or two districts but as more truck land is developed this crop has spread its territory. However, the largest acreages are grown in the Central and South sections, with quite a few being produced on the East Coast and in North Florida. The yield for the last three years is as follows: 1916. 331,878 crates; 1917. 387,000 crates; 1918. 393,450 crates.

CABBAGE
This crop is like snap beans, grown in tract districts of different sections. Still there are certain districts where it is very prominent especially in the Central section. The yield of this crop in Florida for last three years is as follows: 1916. 253,024 crates; 1917. 301,000 crates; 1918. 402,223 crates.

TOMATOES
This is a crop that has been growing in importance for years and Florida ships more than half of the fresh tomatoes that go to northern, eastern and western markets. The East Coast, South and Central Florida are the principal shippers of this crop. However, they are grown to a more or less extent in all the sections in which other truck is grown.

Yield for this crop for the last three years is as follows: 1916. 3,510,933 crates; 1917. 3,619,000 crates; 1918. 4,000,800 crates.

SNAP BEANS
This is a crop that has received considerable attention since vegetables have been grown on a large scale in Florida. The snap bean being a quick crop, it is often planted on land after some other crop has been harvested.

This crop is planted in the late fall for a winter crop then another crop is planted in the winter for an early spring crop, which is the most important of the two plantings.

This crop is an important one in the vegetable districts of the Central, South and East Coast sections as well as in several parts of the North Section.

The yield of snap beans for the last three years is as follows: 1916. 485,410 crates; 1917. 514,300 crates; 1918. 602,000 crates.

IRISH POTATOES
This is a crop that has only been grown in a commercial way in Florida for the last fifteen or sixteen years. Still it has made some rapid strides in that time, especially in certain districts, the most prominent of these being in the East Coast section including a large territory in three counties. There are other districts where the Irish potato is grown rather extensively, especially on some of the new reclaimed (drained) muck and Everglade lands of the State.

This crop is also grown in some of the special vegetable districts as a secondary crop that is behind an earlier crop during the same season. Three other crops are grown as a secondary crop with Irish potatoes: the most important of these being corn, Cowpeas and velvet beans are often put in with the corn, the first for hay and to enrich the soil, the second to be gathered by hogs or cattle.

The Irish potato acreage has so increased until it is one of the large crops of the State today in the truck class.

Acreage yield and value of this crop for the last three years: 1916. 18,000 acres; 1,322,000 bushels; value \$2,664,000. 1917. 25,000 acres; 2,275,000 bushels; value \$4,664,000. 1918. 35,000 acres; 3,500,000 bushels; value \$7,000,000.

NOTABLE CAST WITH NAZIMOVA

Great Star Has Well-Known Players in Her Support in "Toys of Fate", a Play that Sounds the Very Depths of the Soul

Nazimova, the great Russian star of "Toys of Fate", which will be the special attraction at the Auditorium theatre today is surrounded with a brilliant cast of celebrated players in this Screen Classics' production de luxe, released by Metro. Every member of the cast is well known to theatregoers.

Charles Bryant, who appeared opposite the star in her wonderful picture "Revelation," again is her leading man, essaying the role of Henry Livingston, a young American lawyer.

Irving Cummings, one of America's favorite screen players, is cast as Greggo, the gypsy lover. He has been seen as leading man with Ethel Barrymore in Metro's "An American Widow," and was one of the first players ever engaged by Metro, being a player in its initial picture, "The Three of Us."

Dodson Mitchell, who has supported Nazimova in Ibsen plays, has been entrusted the important part of Bruce Griswold. He was Julia Arthur's leading player in "The Eternal Magdalene."

Frank Currier, who has supported practically every star in the Metro constellation, plays Pharo, the old chief of the gypsy tribe. He is remembered for his work as the Prior in "Revelation," with Nazimova.

Nila Mac, who was seen with Nazimova in "War Brides," plays Blanche Griswold. Miss Mac is an attractive player who has had valuable experience on the speaking stage.

GREAT REVIVAL OF COMMERCE IN SOUTH AMERICA

(By Associated Press.)

Para, Brazil Sept. 5.—There were twelve steamers today at the docks of the Port of Para, the "gateway of the Amazons." Commenting upon this unprecedented activity the Estado says it is a long time since such movement of commerce has been seen in this harbor. Brazilians have been looking forward to an increase in trade with the United States and it was a matter of keen regret that only one of the twelve steamers was American. Four were British and seven Brazilian. The American vessel will be here a long time. She is the disabled shipping board steamer "Topocaxi."

Americans in South America feel it is said that notwithstanding the

stories of wonderful progress in American shipbuilding during the war, inspiring tales of smashed records in rivet driving, and finished ships being turned out in marvelous time at mushroom yards on the Atlantic Gulf and Pacific coasts, it is probably true that "haste does not make speed." An American was heard to ask today as he looked at the flags flying from the masts of a dozen vessels: "Are we being left at the post?"

Henry S. Fleming, a New York engineer, has just arrived here from Liverpool. He says that at each of the four ports at which his steamer touched he saw American steamers in a disabled condition.

At Leixoes—the port for Oporto, Portugal—he said there were two American ships in a disabled condition; one was a shipping board steamer, the other one of the wooden ships built during the war rush. At Lisbon there was a shipping board steamer being repaired. At Funchal, Madeira, there was a privately-owned American steamer being patched up. And upon his arrival here he saw the "Topocaxi."

Rumors of a similar condition in other ports, he says, does not argue well for American efforts to build up a first-class merchant marine. Among the comment and questions heard during a discussion of the situation were these:

"What is the matter with the new ships being built and with those being handed over by the shipping board to private charterers? Are they being duly inspected before being handed over, or before putting out to sea? 'Leaking steamers, besides reflecting on our national shipbuilding efforts, mean damaged merchandise and resultant lack of confidence in American-made goods; such a condition results in a definite set-back to our efforts to build up foreign trade on a permanent basis."

British sea captains and sailors smile when anything is said of the American merchant marine being a serious competitor. As one captain puts it: "We are not afraid of ships which cannot sail more than 300 miles without having engine trouble, or being compelled to make for the nearest port."
