## Adm. Towner Gives Inspiring Talk On Constitution At Woman's Club

Rear Admiral George C. Towner in speaking to the members of the Key West Woman's Club Wednesday afternoon, on the "Rights, Privileges and Responsibilities of Citizenship" told them that the "principles adopted in the United States Constitution were the result of practical experience as well as a knowledge of history and political theory."

He continued by saying the United States has provided the best answer that has so far been given to the problems of giving a government the power it needs and at the same time prevent it from abusing that power.

"Under our Constitution — the supreme written law of our country," he said, "the people have all the power in their hands."

"They give the government certain powers and they retain the rest themselves or entrust some powers to lesser bodies such as state governments."

"This distribution is clearly set down in writing and the constitution thus created becomes the supreme law of the land and serves not only to limit the power of the states but those of Congress and the President as well."

"Our constitution provides a check upon tyranny by clearly defining our liberties."

Admiral Towner said "It is not enough to have a written constitution — it must also provide the means for putting its principles into practice and assure that the principles are put into practice."

"The people must also be in a position to periodically call their elected representatives to account, and one sure way of doing this is by fairly frequent election intervals."

"The elections must be secret to protect the individual from intimidation. The question of who can or cannot vote and how the elections are to be conducted is left up to the states."

"It is the state constitutions therefore that protect our right to a secret ballot."

## Appeal Is Made By Red Cross For Christmas-On-The-High-Seas Gifts

Servicemen who must spend Christmas Day at sea won't have to go giftless, according to Judge Eva Warner Gibson, service group chairman of the Key West Red Cross Chapter.

The "Christmas-on-the-High Seas" program is sponsored by the Red Cross and is made possible by groups throughout the nation which contribute gift packages for troops bound overseas and ships' complements, Judge Gibson explained.

This Red Cross service offers a splendid opportunity for local organizations to undertake a worthwhile project and yet give pleasure to many lonely servicemen as well as satisfaction to the gift-givers.

Individuals or groups wishing to take part in the program should notify the Red Cross chapter.

Each package should contain at least three gift items, the total value of which should not exceed \$1.50.

All gifts must be new and must be selected from the following list of approved items: pencil with clip, photo folder, billfold, pencil - type pocket flashlight, pocket - size bottle opener, key ring, cigarette case, pocket - size novel, comic book, playing cards, oilskin pouch ball-point pen, gum or hard candy in airtight cellophane bags and plastic insert for billfolds.

Gifts should be attractively wrapped and delivered to the Red Cross chapter, where they will be shipped in time to reach ports of embarkation before December 1.

A Christmas card, bearing the name of the organization or individual donating the gift, will be provided by the chapter for each package.
