SEVERAL CALLS FOR FIRE DEPT.

COLD WEATHER STILL BEING ACCOMPANIED BY AN UNUSUAL NUMBER OF FIRES IN ALL PARTS OF THE CITY.

Cold weather of yesterday still brought out an accompanying number of fires, and the department expected at all hours to be summoned to scenes of trouble during the day, hence when calls were turned in the department was in such a state of usual preparedness that the fires were soon reached and extinguished. Possibly the most serious fire of the morning occurred on West Wright street, caused from the explosion of a lamp.

The police record showed the following: At 11:47 a. m., at 510 South Palafox street, the place occupied by Peterson was found full of smoke, but there was no damage to speak of, the small fire being extinguished with chemical engine. A defective blue caused the trouble.

At 11:55 a. m., a lamp exploded at the store of S. Balansano, at 115 West Wright street, and before this fire was extinguished considerable damage resulted. The interior of the place alone was damaged.

L. & N. STEAMER WILL BE LOADED

THE E. O. SALT MARSH, WHICH HAS BEEN IN PORT FOR SOME WEEKS, WAS BERTHED TO TAKE CARGO OF TOBACCO AND IRON.

After remaining at anchorage in the stream for more than a month, the British steamship E. O. Saltmarsh was yesterday hauled up and docked in the Louisville & Nashville slip, where, beginning possibly this morning, a large and valuable cargo will be loaded. Much reticence is being maintained as to the steamer's cargo, but it was stated unofficially yesterday that tobacco and pig iron would be two of the most principal and valuable items to be loaded at this time.

Considerable interest was manifested by waterfront people yesterday when they saw the big steamer being hauled up to the assigned berth, for it is believed that, immediately upon arrival the other railroad company steamer, the August Belmont, will start loading, and may take out the first full cargo of cotton for the present season.
