S. A. COSULICH, WIDELY KNOWN HERE, IS DEAD

WAS AT ONE TIME AGENT FOR GULF TRANSIT CO.—DEATH OCCURRED IN NEW ORLEANS, WHERE HE WAS IDENTIFIED WITH PORT'S SHIPPING.

Captain S. A. Cosulich, at one time a resident of this city where he was widely known, died Thursday in New Orleans where he went from Pensacola upon resigning here as general agent for the Gulf Transit Company. He was succeeded by J. B. Roberts, leaving here, he moved his family to New Orleans, where he became general manager of the Austro-American Steamship Line. He was 65 years old. Concerning his death the Pityoune of New Orleans printed the following: After a six months' illness Simon A. Cosulich, New Orleans agent for the Austro-American Steamship Company, died yesterday evening at the Hotel Dieu. Heart trouble is given as the cause. Deceased was 65 years of age. He was a native of Louisiana, Austria, and came to New Orleans some twenty-five years ago. A son, Gilbert Cosulich, is a newspaper man, and was connected at various times with several New Orleans dailies. Taken ill over six months ago, Mr. Cosulich suffered with a lingering ailment. He was confined to his bed at the hospital. His death occurred at 9:40 o'clock yesterday evening. Mr. Cosulich was well known and liked in local commercial circles. He held a very responsible position as the New Orleans agent for the old-established Austro-American line of steamships. He was a close friend of F. Hindermann, the Austrian consul, and leaves scores of other acquaintances. Mr. Hindermann describes the deceased as a virile, aggressive business man, despite his advanced years. Deceased was a cousin of Callisto Cosulich, one of the owners of the Austro-American line. Callisto Cosulich, whose headquarters are at Trieste, Austria, was one of the leading spirits of the Austro-American concern. It was he who helped build the steamship business up to the present standard. His cousin, Simon, was appointed some years ago as New Orleans representative, and as such handled a large part of the steamship company's business throughout the South. Mr. Cosulich had offices at 213 Carondelet, with Captain Frank A. Daniels. He is survived by his wife and a son and daughter. Mr. Cosulich has surviving relatives in Austria. The funeral will take place at 5 o'clock this afternoon at the parlors of Mrs. Thomas E. Lynch.
