New York, Feb. 2.—A light opening demand for stocks to-day advanced prices throughout. Gains were restricted to moderate fractions, but Denver and Rio Grande, Brooklyn Rapid Transit, and Great Northern, preferred, rose. Southern Railway, Chesapeake and Ohio, Kansas City, Southern and Anaconda, 3-4. Consolidated Gas declined 3-4. A growing demand for many of the industrial specialties was followed by some buying of the standard railroad stocks, by Union Pacific, which crossed 178. Most of the speculation was confined to the industrial division and the railroads did not hold their advances well. Chicago preferred, 2-1/4; Chicago and Alton, 2-1/2; American Canadian, preferred, 3-1/2; the common 1-1/4 and American Malt, preferred, 2-1/4. Chesapeake and Ohio, 2-1/2; Anaigamated Copper and Brooklyn Transit, 1-5/8; and Rock Island, preferred, United States Steel, Pullman, Anaconda, Pennsylvania Copper, Brooklyn Gas, American Beet Sugar and International Harvester, 1-1/2. United States Rubber, 1st preferred, declined 1/8. Renewed buying after a slight reaction, carried prices rather higher than before. The demand died out at the higher level. Steel, preferred, rose 1-1/2; St. Louis Southwestern, Corn Products, preferred, 1-1/2; Great Northern, preferred, 1-1/4; and Southern Pacific, Wabash, preferred, Southern Railway, preferred, reading, Erie and New York Central a point. Bonds were unchanged.

**FINED \$50 FOR GAMBLING.**  
There was no delay in the payment of the fine. As soon as Judge Beggs concluded his talk to the defendant, during which he took occasion to say that if the defendant again came before him on such a charge he would severely punish him, Brownson drew forth a roll of bills and proceeded to count out \$2,064, which he tendered and left the court room.

Chicago, Feb. 2.—Liberal realizing sales brought out heavy buying, but prices caused weakness in the wheat market here to-day. Some of the less influential shorts and pit traders were inclined to buy on an advance of 3-4¢ at Liverpool, but the demand was insufficient to prevent a decline of 1-2¢ or more in the distant delivery. # \$2,000 FINE IMPOSED IN THE CRIMINAL COURT

W. P. Brownson Paid Largest Fine Ever Assessed in That Court.

ENTERED A PLEA TO KEEPING A GAMBLING HOUSE IN CONNECTION WITH THE DELUNA CLUB, AND COURT IMPOSED THE HEAVY PENALTY—NUMBER OF OTHER CASES WERE DISPOSED OF DURING DAY.

Under a statute by which he could sentence a defendant to the state penitentiary not exceeding six years or impose a fine not exceeding \$10,000, or both, at the discretion of the court, Judge Beggs, of the criminal court, yesterday fined W. P. Brownson, charged on two counts with keeping a gambling house, \$2,000 and costs or two years in the penitentiary, the defendant having pleaded guilty to the charges.

There were two separate counts against Brownson, the court sentencing him to pay a fine of \$1,000 and costs or serve one year in the penitentiary on each count.

Brownson was arrested and fined for operating a place for gambling in the DeLuna street club. It is thought the heavy penalty imposed on him will tend to put a stop to gambling for profit in this city.

The case against Wm. Camp, charged with keeping a gambling house, will be called up for trial Jan. 17.

The case against Wm. Shepard, charged with keeping a gambling house, will be called Jan. 16.

The fine imposed by the court on Brownson is the heaviest ever imposed in the criminal court of record for this county, for any offense, and is possibly the largest imposed by any court in the south for such an offense.

There have been instances where fines of \$500 and \$1,000 were imposed in the local criminal court, but until yesterday, according to lawyers who have long practiced in the court, such a thing as a fine of \$2,000 and costs, the latter amounting to \$64, was unknown.
