GENERAL LAWTON'S BRILLIANT WORK.

Has Made a Splendid Showing in the Filipino War.

TWENTY-TWO FIGHTS IN 20 DAYS.

Killed Over Four Hundred; Wounded Twice as Many, Captured 28 Towns and Lost Only Six Killed and 21 Wounded.

Manila, May 24.—Maj. Grierson and Maj. Mapua, members of the Filipino general staff, realizing that the Filipino cause was lost, stole through the insurgent lines this morning, and surrendered themselves to the Americans.

The surrender of these two prominent officers is significant, and shows that the Filipino army is disintegrating rapidly, and that the final end is very near. The prisoners acknowledge that Aguinaldo cannot hold out much longer.

Gen. Lawton's rear guard, consisting of detachments of the Third and Twenty-second Infantry, while escorting the signal corps train from San Miguel to Baling today had a running fight for the whole distance of ten miles. The Americans lost one man killed and one officer and fourteen privates wounded. The Americans captured twenty insurgents.

LAWTON'S MAGNIFICENT RECORD.

Manila, May 24.—[Afternoon] Gen. Lawton, with most of his troops, has arrived at Malolos. He marched 120 miles in twenty days, had twenty-two fights, captured twenty-eight towns and destroyed 300,000 bushels of rice. He lost only six men killed and thirty-one wounded. It is estimated his command killed 400 insurgents and wounded twice as many. The Oregon and Minnesota regiments are returning to Manila.

Manila, May 24.—Last night a party of the Twelfth Infantry, while on an over crowded raft loaded heavy with ammunition, on the Pasig river, sunk in the swift current, five men being drowned. The American commissioners and many Americans celebrated the Queen's birthday on board the British cruiser Powerful.

FUNSTON LED THE CHARGE.

Manila, May 24.—Gen. MacArthur and Gen. Funston, with the Kansas and Montana regiments and the Utah battery dispersed, today, 800 insurgents entrenched on the railroad beyond San Fernando, near Santa Anita. The American scouts were fired upon from the trenches unexpectedly and with great effect. The firing being heard at San Fernando, Gen. MacArthur assembled his troops, and marched quickly after the scouts. The Montana regiment flanked the trenches on the left, while the Kansas troops attacked the right flank, Gen. Funston leading the charge at the double quick. The insurgent loss was large. It is reported that twenty Americans were wounded.

American Soldiers in Canada.

Kingston, Ont., May 24.—There are about 600 United States volunteers from New York state in attendance at the Queen's birthday demonstration in this city today.

SHERIFF BERRIE DENIES THE STORY.

Says He Did Not Send Armed Guards to South Brunswick.

NAME OF THE TIMES INFORMANT.

Information Was Considered Reliable or it Would Not Have Been Published.

Sheriff Berrie denies the story printed in The Times yesterday to the effect that he had sent armed guards to South Brunswick to protect the railroad property recently purchased by the Waycross Air Line from the South Brunswick Terminal Co.

He says that it probably originated from rumors that he would be called on for guards. The Times regrets that its information was incorrect. The statements printed were furnished The Times by Gen. Sept. Bonnyman of the Waycross Air Line and were considered reliable.

Lawyers Agreed Before Jury.

In the case of the state vs John Terry the jury stayed out all night Tuesday. Yesterday morning before the jury came in, the lawyers agreed on a consent verdict of assault and battery, and the jury was surprised to learn that their all night watch did not result in deciding the case. They being between a conviction of assault with intent to murder and assault and battery.

Business Transacted Before That Tribunal During Yesterday.

CRIMINAL DOCKET IS STILL ON.

Nothing of special interest developed during the day, with one exception, that of the trial of Frazier Middleton, colored, accused of rape on the person of a young colored girl. During the progress of this trial Judge Bennet had the court room cleared of minor and hangers on who were present from idle curiosity.

State vs Harry Franklin—Assault and battery. Verdict of guilty, fined \$25 and costs or 12 months on the farm.

State vs Middleton Frazier—Rape. Not guilty.
