

### News of a Day In The State Capitol

Atlanta, Aug. 30.—A fight to the court of last resort will be made for the possession of Emilie Giuffrida, the seven-year-old son of Dr. Frank Giuffrida, of this city, who was kidnapped from his home last week by his mother, now divorced from the boy's father and married again to E. G. Wright, of Savannah.

Mrs. Wright and her husband, the "kidnapped" boy, Mrs. E. P. Woodberry and her son, E. P. Woodberry, Jr., are now at the Fulton county jail, awaiting the outcome of Dr. Giuffrida's prosecution of them on the charge that they "kidnapped" the boy and took him away.

Mrs. Wright freely and frankly admits that she and her husband and friends took the boy away, but she denies that there was anything secret about the transaction. She claims that Dr. Giuffrida has no legal claim for the possession of the boy and that she notified him in July that she was coming to Atlanta and get him. She further claims that she and her friends drove up to Dr. Giuffrida's home in an automobile, called the boy and took him with them, then boarded a train for Savannah in broad daylight and made no attempt to hide when they arrived in that city.

Dr. Giuffrida will prosecute his former wife on the charge of kidnapping and will attempt to maintain his right to the possession of the boy.

#### Will Double Track to Camp.

Atlanta, Aug. 30.—Prospects for adequate transportation facilities between Atlanta and Camp Gordon, the great cantonment twelve miles north of the city where 40,000 to 50,000 soldiers of the national army will be trained, are brighter today than they have been at any time since the campaign was started, following the action if the finance committee of the local street railway company in authorizing the construction of a double track trolley line to the camp.

The company was planning to build a single track line when the Atlanta newspapers launched a campaign for a double track line, for shuttle train service on the steam railroad running past the camp into the city, and for a new movement on the highway leading from Atlanta to the camp. However, it is now certain that the double track line will be built.

### MORE COAL BEING HANDLED BY R. R.

HANDLED 20 PER CENT MORE IN APRIL, 1917, THAN SAME MONTH IN 1916.

Atlanta, Aug. 30.—That the railroads of the country in the past four months have handled a great deal more coal than they handled in the same period last year, and hence are not to be held responsible for the high price of coal on the ground of inadequate transportation facilities, is the contention of railway officials of this city, who produce some interesting statistics bearing upon the problem.

These figures show that the railroads handled 20 per cent more coal in April, 1917, than in April, 1916; 24 per cent more in May, 1917, than in May, 1916; 23 per cent more in June, 1917, than in June, 1916; 26 per cent more in July, 1917 than in July, 1916. The total amount of coal which the railroads handled for these four months in 1917 was 28 per cent greater than the total amount for the same months last year.

The railroads themselves are suffering for coal, probably more acutely than any other industry or class of coal users. The head of one of the largest roads entering Atlanta made the statement a few days ago that his road has only a 24 hours' supply on hand.

### GERMAN SUBJECTS MUST BE QUIET

DR. FUNKE FINDS THIS OUT AT AN ATLANTA HOSPITAL RECENTLY.

Atlanta, Aug. 30.—That a man of German connections would be wise to keep his mouth shut if he is opposed to the policies of the United States government has been learned by Dr. John Funke, pathologist of the Grady hospital of Atlanta, as the result of a close call at the hands of a special committee appointed to investigate his conduct which aroused the suspicions of the hospital superintendent.

It was charged that Dr. Funke, whose father was born in Germany, attempted to discharge a chemist in the hospital laboratory to make room for a friend from Texas, who lately came to this country from Turkey, and charged, further, that Dr. Funke on frequent occasions has expressed his opinion in rather uncomplimentary terms concerning President Wilson and this country's entrance into the war.

After going into his case thoroughly, the committee recommends that the doctor be more discreet in his language in the future, and recommends that the chemist whom he discharged be reinstated.


