RECONSIDERED.

Tae Anglican Church Chronicle.

The Anglican Church Chronicle for February opens with a summons for the assembling of the Diocesan Synod on Tuesday, April 19th, from Bishop Willis.

The leading article is devoted to "Sunday Schools," urging their importance and giving advice regarding their management.

A statement respecting the Cathedral fund shows that the family boxes yielded the lady collectors over \$240 the past month. Liberality is urged, as a condition of the contract is that work ceases with the suspension of supplies.

In an article on "Degrading Journalism," a high compliment is paid the Honolulu newspapers for avoiding the pernicious details of crime, especially for ignoring the debasing particulars of the recent aristocratic divorce case in England.

An appeal is made to British subjects to come to the support of the British Benevolent Society, the funds of which are depleted.

The Hawaiian Board of Missions, through Rev. A. O. Forbes, is thanked for a beautifully bound Bible in the Hawaiian language for the Anglican Church.

Queen Victoria's jubilee is urged as an appropriate year for the completion of St. Andrew's Memorial Cathedral, the occupation of which began in the jubilee year of the birth of King Kalakaua.

Local events and Church news from home and abroad occupy much space, although served up with meritorious brevity.

The educational department has an instructive paper on "The Teaching of English to Hawaiians," besides good selected matter, and the minor departments are carefully edited.

Maui Items.

The Makawao congregation has decided to build a new church nearer the center of population.

Very heavy rains have occurred on East Maui.

Frank Baldwin, son of Mr. H. P. Baldwin, met with an accident on Wednesday which came near resulting seriously. He was mounted on one horse and leading another with the rope fastened to his saddle. The led horse ran up a bank suddenly in such a way as to pull Frank off with the rope. He was found shortly afterward by one of the laborers in a state of insensibility, and it was some time before consciousness returned. There were fortunately no bones broken and the boy is doing well.

Hilo Happenings.

The weather of Hilo has been rather stormy lately. The rain has been washing down logs, trees, rubbish, etc., so that the beach was piled up with wood. Men, women and children went to gather it for fuel. The lightning also injured the telephone wires and cut off a good many numbers.

On the 28th of January, 1887, the tern Dora Blum anchored at the port of Hilo after a voyage of twelve days from San Francisco. The brig Hazard left Hilo on the 28th of January for San Francisco, with a cargo of sugar.

Hilo is now full of tourists who have been to see the lava flow at Kahuku. Most of them will go to Honolulu.

The Trip of the Kinau.

The steamer Kinau returned from her excursion to the lava flow on Saturday morning. 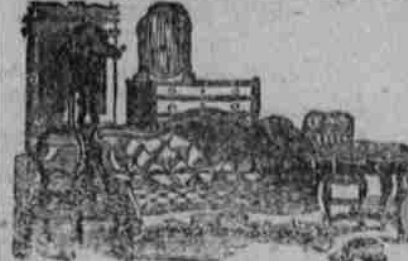
