SUGAR SHIPS.
NEW YORK, December 15.—The Sugar Trust has already chartered fourteen vessels to carry sugar from Hawaii around the Horn.
WAS FINED FIFTY DOLLARS.
Sailor Who Did Not Know His Pockets were Loaded.
Albert Howard, a sailor of the Australia, was found guilty by Judge Wilcox yesterday afternoon of having opium in possession and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$50. His friends paid the money and Howard left by his vessel at 4 o'clock.
The case has peculiarities. When Howard passed out of the gate at the Oceanic dock he was searched, but no opium was found on his person. During the afternoon he got immensely full and was arrested on a charge of being drunk. When searched at the station house a tin of opium was discovered.
Howard claimed to know nothing of the opium, but believed that it was put into his clothes by other than his own hands, and for a purpose. The police, on the other hand, claimed a clear case and proved it.

A KALAKAUA MEDAL.
Secretary of State John Hay has presented to the widow of Admiral Skerrett the medal and diploma conferred on Admiral Skerrett twenty-four years ago by King Kalakaua. The presentation was in recognition of Admiral, then Captain, Skerrett's offer to land sailors and marines to quell the riot following Kalakaua's election. Congress however failed to take action permitting Captain Skerrett to accept these decorations, so that they have lain in the state department ever since. Now that the Hawaiian government as a sovereignty has gone out of existence and Admiral Skerrett is dead, the medal and diploma have been presented to Mrs. Skerrett.

AN ODD COINCIDENCE.
Some interesting history is attached to two bills recently introduced into the House of Representatives for General Wheeler. The bills are to grant pensions to Mrs. Margaret B. Shipp, widow of Lieutenant William E. Shipp who was killed at the battle of San Juan hill, and of Mrs. Louisa D. Smith, widow of Lieutenant William H. Smith, who was killed at the same place. There was a remarkable similarity in the history of the two soldiers. They studied together at West Point, graduated together and after leaving the academy both rose to the rank of lieutenant. They met their deaths in the same battle within fifteen minutes of each other, and finally these bills to pension their widows were introduced into Congress simultaneously.

NEW OFFICERS.
Lieutenant Ludwig was last night elected captain of Company F. N. G. H. Second Lieutenant Boyen was elected first lieutenant, and Sam Johnson was elected second lieutenant of the company. Captain John Schaefer presided at the election.
An addition will be built to Company A's room at the drill shed to accommodate Company F.

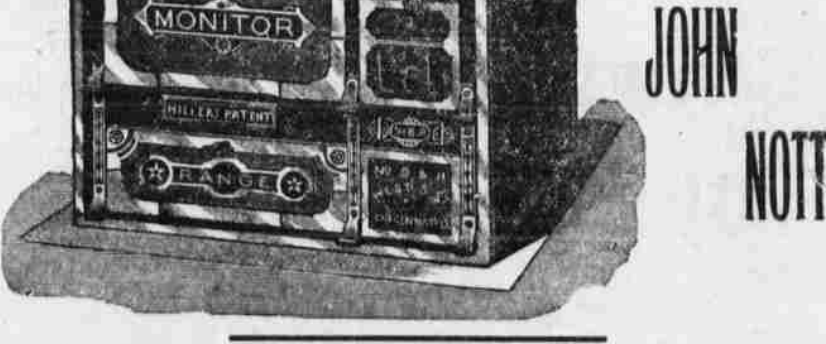
