Marshall McMahon, who was elected President of France by the Assembly, on the 24th of May, in place of President Thiers, was born in 1818 of Irish parentage.

He entered the army in 1835, and has been prominent in every French war since that time. He was taken captive by the Germans at Sedan, at the surrender of Napoleon.

He is unquestionably one of the best soldiers of France, and his record is a brilliant one. Yet with all this, his sympathies are with the Imperial party in France, as it is natural they should be.

He is in the opinion of the Emperor, the chief of the government, beside being Commander-in-Chief of the forces. He has served under the Bourbons, the Orleansists, the Empires of the Republic, and been in turn loyal to each form of government.

But his greatest triumphs have been connected with Imperialism. The order of the Grand Cross and the title of the Duke of Magenta were both conferred by Napoleon.

He is perhaps the most popular man with the soldier. He put down the Commune and delivered Paris when there were fears that the troops might join in the reign of terror.

He did not attend the funeral of Napoleon because he said the act might be construed as a declaration against the Republic. Judged by his past acts, it is impossible to tell what form of government he would prefer.

But as he is master of the situation, and has been brought into power by the aid of enemies of the Republic, that circumstance is most discouraging to the friends of government by the people.

It is believed that our geographical position, makes our commercial relation and property to depend more upon the United States than any other country.

The commerce between the two countries is nearly equal in its amount, but not so the duties levied by the respective governments.—the islands paying to the United States upon their products exported there, about three dollars for every hundred upon goods imported from there, into these islands.
