Honolulu's Telephone System.

The telephone system of Honolulu is very perfect—as good as any place in the world, better than in some. The carriages for hire are a sort of phonon, with top extending over two seats, drawn by one horse. The smooth, level streets, macadamized with coral, enable one horse to draw four passengers with ease at a good round gait. The fare is twenty-five cents for each passenger anywhere within the city limits—a liberal district.

The natives are expert horsemen; they ride small sized, tough mustangs with Mexican saddles and lariats at the saddle bow, at a furious pace. Necessarily they are the best of swimmers and boatmen. The whalers say they are excellent seamen, and, strange as it may appear, for those born in the tropics, withstand the cold of the Arctic seas. The native policemen are a fine looking lot of fellows. They wear white linen caps and pantaloons, and blue sack coats; with their swarthy complexion they present a natty appearance. Withal Honolulu is a quiet place for a city of 20,000 inhabitants composed of so many discordant elements. Foreigners dress according to individual taste, in suits of white, with straw or pith East India hats; others wear somber black; all wear the thinnest of material. One may meet in the streets English, American, Japanese, Chinese, South Sea Islanders and Hawaiians jostling each other on the sidewalks. Business closes at 5 o'clock. The sentries at the palace wear uniforms of white linen, with pith helmets. All natives are admitted to the grounds. White men are not allowed to enter unless they have a pass from the proper authorities.—Cor. Cleveland Leader.

What Fruits Resemble.

The cocconut is in many respects like the human skull, although it closely resembles the skull of the monkey. A sponge may be so held as to remind one of the unflushed face of the skeleton, and the meat of an English walnut is almost the exact representation of the brain. Plums and black cherries resemble the human eyes; almonds and some other nuts resemble the different varieties of the human nose, and an open oyster and its shell are a perfect image of the human ear.

The shape of almost any man's body may be found in the various kinds of mammoth pumpkins. The open hand may be discerned in the form assumed by scrub willows and growing celery.

The forms of many mechanical contrivances in common use may be traced back to the patterns furnished by nature. Thus, the hog suggested the plow; the butterfly, the ordinary hinge; the toad-stool, the umbrella; the duck, the ship; the fungous growth on trees, the bracket. Any one desirous of proving the oneness of the earthly system will find the resemblance in nature an amusing study, to say the least.—New York Market Journal.
