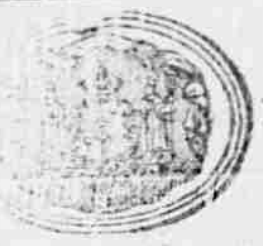


BY AUTHORITY.

It is required that the wood be of algeroba, monkey-pod, encalyptus or any of the hard native woods; that it be cut in (4) four feet lengths and be split, if necessary, so as to be easily handled; that it be piled at Kalaupapa, and that it be measured by the Agent of the Board of Health.
