Committed for Larceny. In the Police Court yesterday, George Summers was charged with the larceny of a revolver, bottle of liquor, \$100 in Hawaiian paper money, a \$5 greenback, \$100 in Kalakaua silver, and \$235 in gold coin, the property of A. Morgan. The latter stated he missed the money and goods about November 5th. He identified the pistol.

A witness named C. Mitchell stated he was with the defendant November 5th and the latter gave him a pistol and \$25 in money.

A steward on one of the steamers stated he met Summers on November 5th on Smith's lane. Went to his room and saw a bottle of liquor and a quantity of money there.

The defendant was committed for trial to the next term of the Supreme Court.

An Eloping Couple. A private letter was received by the Mariposa by a resident of this city, from a friend in San Francisco stating that a Miss Mollie Nichols of Marysville, Cal., had eloped with a married man. They staid in San Francisco a short time as man and wife under the name of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Waldo, and then took the steamer for Honolulu. As the letter was dated January 4th, the eloping couple must have come down on the Australia, and probably are somewhere on the islands. Miss Mollie is described as rather tall, with dark hair and very handsome. Her partner has light brown hair, blue eyes and wears a moustache. The letter further states that the man stole \$600 to elope with.
