Annual Parade of the Honolulu Fire Department.

The Different Companies Turn Out in Good Numbers—Beautifully Decorated Engines—The Parade an Entire Success.

The annual parade of the Honolulu Fire Department took place yesterday, and was one of the most successful ever held.

Engine Company No. 1, which came next in the procession, was commanded by Foreman Robert More.

Engine Company No. 2, in command of Foreman Chas. J. McCarthy, made a very fine display.

Engine Company No. 4, in charge of Foreman James H. Boyd, had a large turnout of members.

Pacific Hose Company No. 1 had their hose carriage out, drawn by four horses, and nicely decorated.

Protection Hook and Ladder Company made a capital showing.

Chinese Engine Company No. 5 came next, and the members turned out in large numbers.

The line of March was about the same as announced in yesterday's ADVERTISER, and the parade was witnessed by a very large number of people.

In the afternoon the different companies assembled at their houses and partook of collations.

Hook and Ladder Company had their spread about noon, and a fine one it was, too.

Chinese Company No. 5 met at 4 o'clock to have their lay-out, and it was a very creditable one in every respect.

This company gave an elegant collation in its house at 2 o'clock. It was served in caterer Hart's best style and did him much credit.

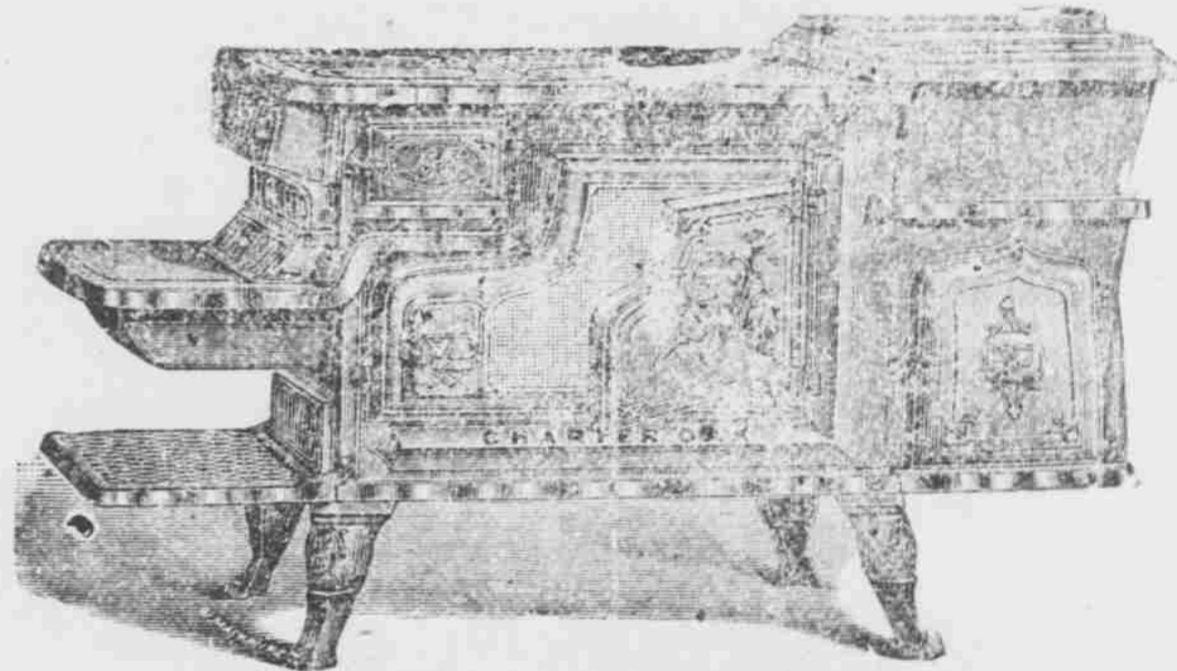
