The Last Ceremony.

The Masons and hundreds of friends gathered yesterday afternoon at the Masonic Temple, not to listen, alas, to Paul Neumann's witty, bright and kind addresses, but to pay the last honor to the friend and companion whose name will not be responded to, when called, any longer.

The services were very impressive under the direction of Grand Master Wm. H. Wright, who was assisted by W. H. Cornwell, W. A. Allen, W. A. Graham, all pastmasters of the Lodge.

A quartette composed of Miss von Holt, Miss Rodgers, Mr. Wall and Judge Stanley sang "Rock of Ages" and "Nearer My God to Thee," and then the casket, in which were the remains of one of the most brilliant men, who ever set foot on Hawaiian soil, was carried to the hearse. The honorary pall bearers were Andrew Brown, General A. S. Hartwell, F. M. Hatch, John A. Hassinger, W. G. Irwin, Judge W. A. Whiting, Judge Morris M. Estes and Col. A. G. Hawes, and the casket was carried to the hearse by J. A. McCandless, A. F. Gillillan, Clarence H. Crabbe, John S. Walker, J. W. Pratt, W. L. Frazee.

The funeral cortege was very imposing and showed the high esteem and love entertained towards our departed fellow citizens. The interment took place in Nuuanu cemetery, and by order of the Governor a detachment of the militia attended the funeral. The High Sheriff who, with his deputy, appeared officially at the funeral sent a squad of mounted patrolmen and a detachment of foot police as an escort to the dead man, who as Attorney-General, attorney, and friend had been so closely connected with the Department. At the grave the Masonic rites were performed, the address by the Master, W. H. Wright, the farewell, delivered by Judge M. M. Estes, and the memorial by Dr. Grossman.

The bereaved widow, prostrated with grief was unable to attend the funeral and Mrs. Fooke, the daughter of the deceased escorted by her husband was the chief mourner. The other children of the late Paul Neumann are absent from the Territory. R. I. P.

Hartwell to Neumann.

In moving for adjournment of the Supreme Court in honor of the memory of Paul Neumann yesterday, Judge Hartwell said:

"It is with profound regret that I announce to the court the demise at 2 o'clock this morning of our friend and brother—the friend and brother of all who knew him—Paul Neumann. We learn that death came to him, as I am sure he would have wished it to come—suddenly and quickly. Neumann was like an ancient Greek in his love of beauty, of beautiful things and topics, and in his fine sense of proportion. He would not intrude serious views, but from many things which I recall that he has said to me in the years that are gone, from his acts and life, I am sure that death found him prepared.

"I ask the court to designate 10 o'clock next Friday morning for the Bar Association to present in this court its formal resolutions, and in behalf of the Bar Association, in affectionate memory of Paul Neumann, I move that the court do now adjourn for the day."
