True Democracy Defined

Bourke Cockran's Terrible Arraignment of the Policy of Despotism and Plunder.

(Continued from yesterday.)

"The profit of conquest has always resulted in the construction of a few palaces, the profits of industry in multiplying the number of homes. Conquest produces fortunes for a few, industry abundance for a multitude. Conquest creates individual splendor, industry general comfort. Conquest brutalizes, industry humanizes. Conquest always leads to decay and ultimately to ruin, industry to an ever increasing prosperity, moral and material."

While the full fruits of imperialism in the East are as yet undisclosed, in Cuba it has thrown off its mask. There we see this government reduced to impotency and Cuba to ruin by a quarrel between two hands of imperialistic plunderers. We have seen the passage of a bill which the imperialistic President himself declared an obligation of honor and justice for Cuba and prevented by abhorrent force. Never in the history of the world has the so-called imperialism and its power of demoralization been rewarded so conspicuously.

"I know of nothing more humiliating to American citizenship than the story of the struggles between the administration and the lobbyists, ending in the victory of the adventurers and the humiliation of the government.

You remember the accounts of Mr. Roosevelt's campaign for reciprocity. While the bill was trembling in the balance we read in the papers most friendly to him accounts, evidently inspired, of his labors for the passage of the bill. And with whom was he laboring? Not with the chiefs of his own party. Not with the chiefs of the opposition. Not with exponents of public opinion in the press, on the platform or in the pulpit. Not with any recognized authority in State or nation, either in official life or party management. But with a man named Oxnard who held no place either in the public service or in the public respect. We were told that the President labored with Oxnard, and we began to think that relief was possible. We read that he had a long interview with Oxnard, and our hopes ran high.

"We were told that he had given Oxnard a bad half hour, and, behold! it turns out that while the head of the State made faces at the lobbyist and discharged robust language at him, the lobbyist held the government in a grip so firm that President, Congress, newspapers, the conscience of the American people and the opinion of the world are defied—Cuba remains the spoil of the plunderer, the victim of imperialism and the burning shame of this nation."

One hundred and thirty years ago a young French officer, destined afterward to be the first great leader of the Revolutionary army, when returning from a voyage, was deeply moved and shocked by seeing the King of France in the presence of the court and of his army standing beside the carriage of his mistress, who exercised the real power of the State and was suspected of polluting its justice. But at least Du Barry had beauty to lend a tinge of extenuation to old Louis' frailty. I have never heard that Oxnard had possessed either physical charms or moral rectitude, yet he has been able to stay the course of justice, not merely in a private controversy, but in a great national emergency. Of course there can be no
