Puna Lands Allotted.

Hilo, Sept. 19—Seventeen hundred and forty one acres of land passed from the ownership of the Territory last Saturday into the hands of private parties. The lands were allotted by Agent E D Baldwin after being advertised. There were but thirteen allotments made. The largest was a tract of 999 acres, which was taken by an Hawaiian at 50 cents an acre. The other tracts ranged from 20 to 160 acres in extent and were appraised at from 75 cents to \$5 per acre.

The lands allotted are situated in Puna.
