The will of Morris Louison was admitted to probate yesterday.

The Mauna Loa sailed for Maui and Hawaii ports at noon today.

M. G. Silva has been appointed guardian of the Da Costa minors in the sum of \$800.

Judge Robinson yesterday granted the motion to amend the divorce libel in the Harrub case.

Mr. W. W. Hall will read the Gettysburg address at the Memorial Day celebration at Nuuanu cemetery.

The J. W. Hall rape case trial was begun before a jury in Judge Robinson's Court at 10 o'clock this morning.

Sentence was suspended yesterday by Judge Robinson as to Maka and Kapana, both of whom pleaded guilty of larceny.

The steamer Sierra arrived from the Colonies at 9 o'clock this morning and will sail for San Francisco at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

The Hawaiian Band will give a complimentary concert on the Oceanic wharf when Bishop and Mrs. Willis depart for Tonga.

The annual meeting of the Hawaiian Woman's Club is being held this afternoon at the residence of Mrs. W. W. Hall, Nuuanu Avenue.

J. J. Combs has sued his wife Ella Combs for divorce in Judge Kalua's court. Adultery is alleged to have been committed by the defendant.

H. G. Middleditch has sued J. M. Monsarrat and M. D. Monsarrat upon a note for \$660 alleged to be due and unpaid. The total amount of judgment asked is \$673.93.

A special meeting of the Hooulu and Houla Lahui society is to take place, at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, at the Kapiolani Maternity Home. All members are desired to attend.

Emil Ney, the descendant of the Brav' Marechal, announces that he will leave his usual haunts here to go to Hilo where he will be the bailiff of Judge Little's Court. If so, too-too!

CLOSES A SUCCESSFUL SEASON.

A Large Audience Greeted Frederick Warde on His Last Appearance Here.

No city in the United States could have furnished a better audience, or a more enthusiastic demonstration than that which greeted Frederick Warde on his last appearance at the Opera House last evening. Every seat was taken and the elite of Honolulu Society intermingled with all classes to greet the great personifier of Shakespeare in his immortal works. All the actors last night were splendid in the rendition of their respective parts. Warde in the "seven ages," Charles D. Herman as the Moor, Barry Johnstone as Hamlet, McLeod as Falstaff, O'Connor, Hynes, Miss Ashton, Miss Trescott, Miss Bertelle and Miss Warde all played their parts effectively and well.

Mr. Walter G. Smith, sustained his reputation as a "litterateur" and orator, in his talk on "Shakespeare and the Players." He at once captured his audience and kept it under the charm of his well delivered dissertation.

Frederick Warde at the conclusion of the second part, returned a courteous compliment for the good attendance of the people of this city throughout the dramatic season. He made a short address during which he presented the thanks of his company to the Press for their consideration, courtesy and kindness, to Mr. Smith for his prompt response to his invitation to speak upon Shakespeare, to his brother Elks for their welcome and warm fraternal greeting, and to Captain Berger and the two Hawaiian girls for the help given which assisted materially the success of his productions. In conclusion Frederick Warde expressed the hope that he may visit again Honolulu, which is cordially endorsed by all the people of this city. Au Revoir! But not Good-Bye! Aloha!

Says Stock Was Stolen.

Victor Hoffman filed an answer yesterday to the application of L. H. Dee for a writ of mandamus to compel the issue to him of 250 shares of stock of the McKechnie Paint and Wall paper Co. The defendant denies that Dee acquired 250 shares from H. McKechnie, and that the said 250 shares of paid up stock and the same number of shares of assessable stock, on which \$319 had been paid, were sold to the McKechnie Co. It is further answered "that on or about the fifth day of April, 1902, the said H. McKechnie, without warrant or right in law, and without the knowledge and consent of the said corporation or any of its officers, agents or stockholders, did wrongfully and feloniously abstract the said 250 shares of paid up stock from the office of the said H. McKechnie Paint and Wall Paper Co., which said shares are the same as set forth in the petition herein."—P. C. A.

**CHAPTER 52, CIVIL LAWS 1897.
TERM TREASURY NOTES.**

Sec. 676. The Treasurer upon the approval of the Governor may issue, at par, upon public tender, to any person or corporation Term Treasury Notes in the name of the Hawaiian Treasury.

Sec. 677. The said Treasury Notes shall be issued in sums of One Thousand Dollars or multiple thereof, and shall not exceed at any one time One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars.

Sec. 678. The rate of interest shall not exceed seven per cent. per annum, free of tax, and be payable at the due date of the note.

Sec. 679. The tenders for the said Treasury Notes shall state the rate of interest for gold tenders, or for silver tenders, and whether to be repaid in gold or silver coin.

Sec. 680. The term for which any Treasury Note shall be issued shall not exceed seven months.
