ACT 42.

An Act Conferring Additional Jurisdiction Upon Certain District Magistrates.

BE IT ENACTED by the Executive and Advisory Councils of the Provisional Government of the Hawaiian Islands:

SECTION 1.—The criminal jurisdiction of the District Magistrates of Lihue, Island of Kauai; Honolulu, Island of Oahu; Waikuku and Lahaina, Island of Maui; Hilo, Hamakua, Kohala and Kaa, Island of Hawaii; over all offenses wherein the District Courts now have jurisdiction, shall be and hereby is made co-extensive with the Judicial Circuits in which their respective districts are situated.

SECTION 2.—This Act shall take effect from the date of its publication.

ACT 40.

An Act to Increase the Facilities to Depositors and Providing for Term Deposits in the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank.

BE IT ENACTED by the Executive and Advisory Councils of the Provisional Government of the Hawaiian Islands:

SECTION 1. The Postmaster-General, as Manager of the Postal Savings Bank, with the consent and approval of the Minister of Finance, may issue in any person Term Deposit Certificates in the name of the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank for deposits of not less than Five Hundred Dollars nor more than Five Thousand Dollars.

SECTION 2. The amounts so deposited shall draw interest at a rate not to exceed six per cent. per annum to be computed in accordance with the law regulating the Bank. Such deposits shall not in the aggregate exceed \$150,000 at any one time.

SECTION 3. The term for which any deposit shall be received under this Act shall not exceed twelve months.

SECTION 4. The form of the said certificates shall be as follows, and shall contain the conditions hereinafter set forth:

Present this Certificate at the Postal Savings Bank at the expiration of the term stated herein. Interest will cease at that date. Holders at a distance may indorse this

Certificate and send by mail to the Postal Savings Bank, when it will be paid. This Certificate may be transferred by endorsement, and principal with interest will be paid to the holder hereof.

QUEEN'S HOSPITAL

Report of the Biennial Meeting Held Yesterday Afternoon.

The biennial meeting of the members of the Queen's hospital took place yesterday morning at the chamber of commerce, Mr. James I. Dowsett presiding. The meeting was well attended, and after it was called to order Mr. F. A. Schaefer read his report as secretary, which was accepted. The following is a copy of the document:

BIENNIAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE QUEEN'S HOSPITAL. HONOLULU, July 1st, 1893.

To the Members of the Queen's Hospital. Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit to you my report as secretary of your society for the biennial period closing today.

The purveyor's biennial report and statistical tables, to which I beg to call your attention, show an enlarged sphere of usefulness and of popularity with the native population, of the Queen's hospital, than it has enjoyed at any previous period, in so far as the number of native inmates of the hospital greatly exceeds that of preceding biennial periods.

The following figures will prove of interest: During the two years now under review 1056 persons have been received as indoor patients, as against 931 during the preceding period. Of these 590 were Hawaiians, against 380 the previous term; 27 Chinese, 173 Japanese and 356 of other nationalities.

The number of dispensary patients was at the same time 493. The death rate was 11.94 per cent., the number of deaths being 134 in a total of 1131 indoor patients. Of these deaths 22 occurred within 24 hours and 13 within 48 hours after admission of the sick into the hospital.

The biennial expenditures of the hospital (the same being the purveyor's returns) amounted to \$51,530.55 for the two years, a monthly average of \$2147.49, while the receipts from paying patients amounted to \$18,301, an average of \$763 per month.

The receipts of the Queen's hospital from the seamen and passenger tax amounted to \$12,638 for the two years just closed.

I may here mention that Mr. Andre Alexandre Cornist, a Frenchman and for many years a resident of these islands, very recently deceased, donated by will \$500 for the establishment of a fund at the hospital, at the disposal of the French consul in this port. This sum will very shortly be placed in the hands of your treasurer for investment. Another donation of practical charity by which the countrymen of the deceased donor will be directly benefitted.

The biennial period above reviewed shows a commendable improvement in the hospital regime by the adoption of distinct rules and regulations to govern the hospital medical service, under which a physician and surgeon were employed, and a staff of practical nurses to look after the sick by day and night, is the most important change made in the internal arrangement of the hospital service, and this in addition to the staff proved a timely step in advance, and the good work accomplished by these nurses speaks for itself.

With the coming of the nurses many improvements were introduced, the number of patients here, but all with the view of increasing the efficiency of the hospital as well as the comfort and well-being of its inmates.

All these changes and improvements effected in the course of these two years account in a measure for the increased expenditures, still they were needed and prove to be a success. At the same time the average receipts from pay patients have increased somewhat.

I take great pleasure in announcing to you a most liberal and generous donation from Hon. Chas. R. Bishop, i. e., \$10,000, for the construction of a two story wing to be built of brick, and now in course of erection at right angles with the old main hospital building. The lower story of rooms contains two large wards, and the upper story eight good sized rooms with modern improvements, such as are adopted by the better class of hospitals of the present day. These upper rooms are intended for female pay patients, and they will fill a much-needed want. The board of trustees have adopted a vote of thanks to Mr. Chas. R. Bishop for his generous donation, which has been conveyed to him by the secretary.

There is nothing of special interest to be added, but I trust my report upon the increased number of inmates in the hospital and also upon the manifold improvements effected, will impress you with the fact that the Queen's hospital occupies a large sphere of usefulness in this community, and so far as circumstances will permit, keeps pace with other institutions of the kind in other advanced countries.

Honolulu, July 1, 1893. Mr. J. H. Paty submitted his report as treasurer, which was also adopted. The expenses for the past 24 months amounted to \$60,296.88, which exceeded the receipts by \$1147.70, which amount is still due him. The report closed with a footing of \$633,583.10, which represents the expenditures for the past 34 years.

It was announced that the minister of the interior, on behalf of the government, had named the following gentlemen to act as trustees for the next four years: A. S. Clegg, W. G. Irwin, G. Baier, C. M. Cooke and H. W. Schmidt. The society elected as trustees for the same term, Rev. Alex. Mackintosh, C. P. Ianke, T. May, C. L. Carter and E. F. Bishop.

A committee of five was appointed to increase the life membership of the corporation. The following gentlemen compose it: H. A. Widemann, Rev. A. Mackintosh, H. W. Schmidt, and C. M. Cooke.

After the meeting of the members of the corporation adjourned, the

trustees transacted some important business. The following report was read and accepted:

To the Trustees of the Queen's Hospital. GENTLEMEN: We have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending May 31, 1893:

The number of patients at present in the hospital is 82; viz.: 43 Hawaiians (33 males 10 females), 2 Chinese, 9 Japanese and 28 of other nationalities; 35 paying.

The number of admissions during the quarter was 74; viz.: 86 Hawaiians (61 males 25 females), 3 Chinese, 25 Japanese and 90 of other nationalities.

Deaths 19; viz.: 6 Hawaiians (2 males 4 females), 2 Chinese, 4 Japanese and 7 of other nationalities; of these 2 died within 24 hours and 3 within 48 hours of admission.

The causes of death were: Bright's disease 1, burn 2, cerebral tuberculosis 1, fever 1, gunshot wound 1, heart failure 1, heart disease 2, old age 1, phlegmonous inflammation of throat 1, phthisis pulmonalis 1, pleurisy 1, pneumonia 1, pulmonary abscess 1, tertiary syphilis 1.

The highest number of indoor patients was 92; lowest 74; daily average 81.

Number of prescriptions 587. Twenty minor, 9 major and 2 post mortem operations were performed during the quarter.

The number of patients treated in the hospital was as follows: March 189, April 133, May 151. Respectfully submitted, GEO. P. ANDREWS, C. B. WOOD, Honolulu, May 31, 1893.

The executive committee reported progress regarding the construction of the new Bishop wing to the hospital which is being built by Harris Bros.

It was announced that Miss Harris had been engaged as night nurse. C. L. Carter moved that a wooden carpet be laid in the two wards which will form the lower floor of the new wing. This was carried.

A committee composed of C. L. Carter, C. P. Ianke and J. B. Atherton was appointed to examine the hospital and to suggest any improvements at the next regular meeting of the corporation.

The regular visiting committee for the next quarter will consist of C. Baier, E. F. Bishop and M. P. Robinson.

The trustees elected the following officers: Secretary, F. A. Schaefer; treasurer, J. H. Paty; auditor, M. P. E. Bishop; executive committee, A. S. Clegg, J. H. Paty, J. T. Waterhouse, Jr., M. P. Robinson and F. A. Schaefer.

A PROMINENT NEVADAN

Who Will Return by the Australia Next Week.
