

LOCAL BREVITIES.

A lost key has been found. W. W. Hall returned on yesterday's Hall. "Caprice," with its songs and dances, this afternoon at 3 o'clock. Alfred Carter left for Maui last evening. He will be away for a month. The sale of Godfrey's polling list and directory continues. It is a useful reference book. Sam McKeague will be back on the Australia. He has been in the States for some months. W. P. Fennell, of Punaluu, was greatly surprised a week ago, to be presented with twin daughters. A guard relief of twelve men escorted the money across the street to the new vault yesterday. The case of the mutineers on the Nanshan will come up in the Circuit Court at 10 o'clock this morning. An adjourned meeting of the American League will be held this evening, to talk anniversary celebration. William Eassie, of Eassieville, Kauai, will be here next week. He will make a business trip to Waihee Plantation. Big improvements have been made in the postoffice, which add greatly to the ease with which the mail is sorted. Large fines for ranning che fames are getting frequent. A Chinaman had to pay \$100 yesterday for his sport. The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Star will be held tomorrow evening at 7:30, at the Chamber of Commerce. A stranger fell in a fit or spasm in the Y. M. C. A. reading room yesterday afternoon. Dr. McGrew was called and cared for the man. Those of the clergymen who were sent tickets to last evening's performance of "Saints and Sinners" returned them to Mr. Dailey yesterday. The space next to the Sharpshooters' room in the drill shed may be transferred into a reading room with game tables and a billiard table. Mr. Klemme, the defeated independent, has not yet decided to institute a contest. Under the law, he has plenty of time in which to think it over. Colonel Fisher believes that a social hall at the drill shed would be beneficial to the battalion. It would increase the interest of the volunteer companies. It is Mr. C. Bolte, and not Jos. Marsden, who is secretary of the Planters' Labor and Supply Company, and who is preparing data for the approaching annual meeting. 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THE HAWAIIANS ARE AROUSED.

Their Club Speaks Plainly in Some Resolutions.

Members Will Serve as Soldiers if Required—Preference for Party Men Is Their Idea of Politics.

There was a rousing meeting of the Hawaiian Republican Club at the American League hall last night. The attendance was large and the proceedings interesting from start to finish. In the club there was a score of practical politicians, and they are intent on having a voice in affairs.

The first thing was the adoption of a motion instructing the secretary to write a nice letter to James A. Kennedy. This note is to congratulate the A. U. P. chairman on his able conduct of the campaign. The club is especially pleased over the election of three Hawaiians to the House. They had been told by disturbers and mischief-makers that the natives would be "slaughtered."

A resolution offered provoked quite a discussion, but was finally adopted by unanimous vote. It was to the effect that every member of the organization pledged himself to assist in resisting any attempt to restore Mrs. Dominis to the throne or to set up Princess Kaiulani as a ruler. The debate was over the propriety of mentioning the names. There was no division of opinion on the sentiment of the resolution. It was further voted that in the event of any uprising or invasion the club members should, through the President, be placed at the disposal of the military department of the Government. A copy of this resolution will be forwarded to the Executive Council of the Republic.

Next the club talked practical politics and they were at it till 11 o'clock. A resolution was offered saying in about so many words that the men who supported the independent candidate Monday should, when desiring employment, be referred to him. The club claims that a number of men in the service of the Government did their best to defeat the annexation ticket. Further they assert that others who expect places or work were opposed to the nominees of the dominant party. The club was aroused on this subject through knowledge of projected Government work and the fact that men who voted for the independent ticket in the Fourth District would want places. The club declares that in this instance idle Hawaiians who stood by the annexation party, should be given the preference. The matter will be laid before the big men at the executive building.
