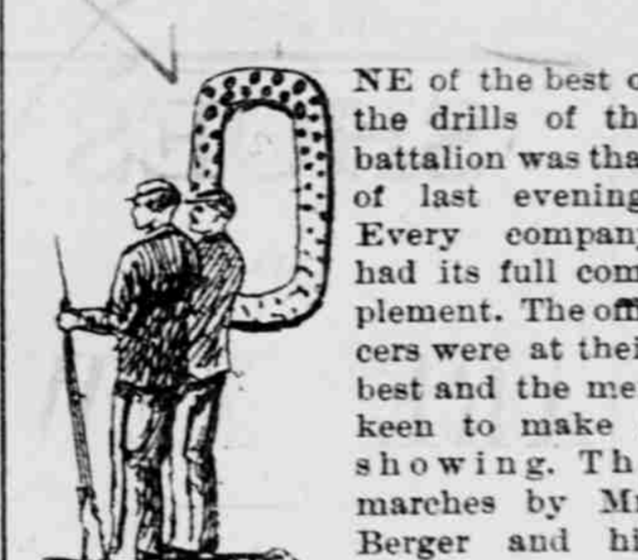

DRILLING IN THE MOONLIGHT.

Battalion's Fine Appearance on Union Square Last Night.

IMPROVEMENT IS TO BE NOTED.

Regiment Has Reached a High Standard—Well Fitted for Active Service. New Uniforms—Condition of Arms. The Fighting Men and Their Leaders.



NE of the best of the drills of the battalion was that of last evening. Every company had its full complement. The officers were at their best and the men keen to make a showing. The marches by Mr. Berger and his boys were inspiring. Spectators at Union Square numbered over a thousand. Several times the boys were cheered. Remarks passed on the battalion were uniformly of a flattering nature. Marked improvement has been made in the force during the past few months. All are imbued with an interest in the regiment. The effort to make it an efficient force than can act quickly and that will act unhesitatingly. The hearts of the men in their work and the best of feeling exists between the rank and file. Confidence to the utmost is reposed in the skill, courage and judgment of the superiors.

For drilling and military bearing the First Regiment, N.G.H., will compare favorably with even regulars in the United States Army. There is not a citizen soldiery known that can produce as many expert marksmen as this battalion. Company drills are surprisingly good. For the opportunities there have been the regiment is handled superbly. Battalion drill occurs but once a month. Col. Fisher has lately instituted "swing" battalion drills fortnightly. On these occasions two companies are maneuvered in the drill shed as a regiment. President Dole, Minister Hatch, other Cabinet members and Adjutant General Soper of the commander-in-chief's staff are taking a greater interest than ever in affairs of the army. All this pleases the boys and encourages them to greater effort towards perfection in performance of their duties.

The equipment of the regiment is now about what it should be. Within the past month new uniforms—made here—have been issued. Most of these were worn last night for the first time. They fit well and are of good material. All that is now needed is tenting and camp equipment in case of a call for service out of town. Since the men have become good shot more attention is paid to small arms. The rifles are not of the latest pattern but they make excellent weapons and are in good condition. By re-loading shells the cost to the Government in ammunition has been greatly reduced. The fighting gear, Maxims and heavy cannon are all ready for instant use. Regulars have been drilled to them, and in practice they are worked beautifully. The health of the men in the barracks is better than it ever has been and

SOME OF BILLY'S DEBTS.

He Had A Weakness For Riding In Carriages.

Mr. Aldrich Informs His Numerous Creditors That He Does Not Intend To Go Away At Present.

The many times mentioned Aldrich bankruptcy case came up again yesterday, before Judge Whiting for a hearing on respondent's motion to dissolve the writ of *ne exeat*. The matter was partially heard and continued until this afternoon. At the request of W. A. Kinney, the attorney for the assignee, Aldrich took the stand and in response to a question stated that he had no intention of leaving the country at present, and further stated that his presence here or departure depended on circumstances. He informed Mr. Kinney that he was adjudged a bankrupt in December, 1893, and since that time he has received sums of money monthly. At the date of adjudication he was in receipt of \$100 or \$150 each month, but during February or March of the present year the amount was increased to \$200. This increase lasted until May, when the amount was cut down to \$100. The money comes from the trustee's of his father's estate and represents the income of a fourth interest. The witness did not expect an increase in the allowance and was of the opinion that the present income might be cut down owing to hard times. According to his story the assignee has not made a demand on him for money, and in the next breath, he says that Mr. Davis asked him to sign an order upon the trustee of the estate for his allowance, but he declined to do so.

Regarding Aldrich's bankruptcy case, creditors have proven the following claims amounting in all to over \$4,000. Groceries, \$855; wines and liquors, \$438; wearing apparel, \$906; carriage hire, \$303; meat bills, \$170; steamship company, \$244; rent, \$150; doctors, druggists and dentists, \$258; hardware, \$113; milk, \$63; jewelry, \$40; Hawaiian band, \$25; notes, etc., \$82.

COALITION MADE.

Mystic and Kealia Lodges K. of F. Are Now One.

The amalgamation of Mystic Lodge of this city and Kealia Lodge, Knights of Pythias of Kealia, was effected last evening. Separate meetings preceded the union session of the lodges at Mystic hall. Most of the details of the transaction had been arranged in advance by conference committees. The proceedings were entirely amicable. Mystic is now under the twenty-third number and the treasury and property of Kealia. The new members are nearly all young men. Several of them have lately come to Honolulu to live and a few others are on outside Oahu plantations.

NOTES OF THE EVENING.

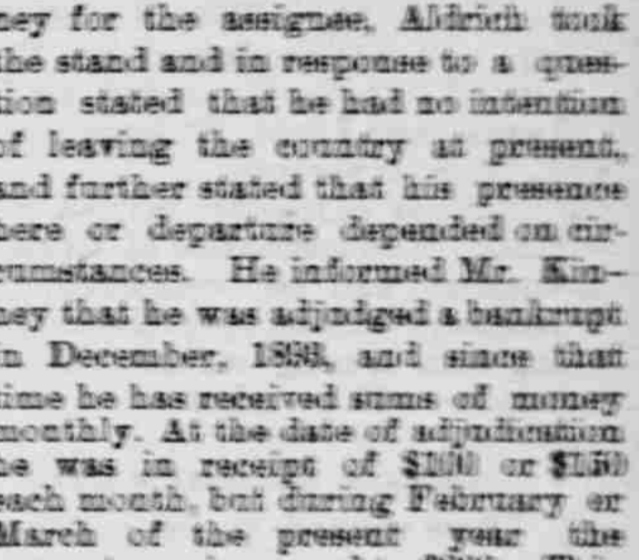
