

CONSPIRING AGAINST LARSEN.

A Special Officer Bribes Another to Commit a Crime.

Wanted the Detective to be Stabbed, to Get Him Out of the Way—Plot Falls Through.

Another conspiracy case has come to light. This time the life of the Government is not aimed at, but the life of one man is. That man is William Larsen, who has charge of the local detective service. Information came direct to him that one man had offered another money to stick a knife into him. Mr. Larsen has reported the matter to Marshal Hitchcock, who will hold an investigation.

Mr. Larsen was seen last evening about the conspiracy, but he declined to talk, saying, "The matter is in the hands of the Marshal, and for that reason I do not care to discuss it." From another source, however, the facts were gained. It seems that there are three men now on the special police service who have taken a dislike to Larsen. The men recently arrived from California, and that is about all that is known of them. For some reason, they wish him removed from the force, and are credited with saying that they will accomplish their purpose even if they are compelled to resort to foul means. They have started on the latter track, as a man called at Larsen's house the other day and informed him that he was in hard luck since his arrival in town, and had been sharing the room of one of these men. Several days ago he was offered \$20 if he would "stick a knife into Larsen." He took the money, and, after deliberating on the matter overnight, he decided that he would not make the assault, and returned the bribe. His room-mate then upbraided him for his cowardice, as he called it, and then threatened him with all sorts of punishment. The man has since tried to get employment on outgoing vessels, but his friend has preceded him in each case, and has slandered him, with the result that he was refused work.

One of the men has made himself particularly obnoxious to Larsen. He has been dogging his footsteps continually, but does not get within arms' length, or otherwise he would have to ride for some time to come, as the detective officer has the reputation of being a very determined man when he is started. It is learned that Larsen is not worrying over the matter, and, as one of his friends remarked last night, "when any of the three men make a break, Larsen will be on hand and it will be a case where the best man will win."

William Larsen, the man who has been conspired against, has been on the local police force for a long time. He knows every thief in the country, and, as a rule, when robbers are committed it does not take him long to locate the guilty ones. It was only the other day that he unearthed a burglary that had been a puzzle to the authorities. He is considered a first-class man, and like other officers in his line makes enemies among people who have no respect for laws.

First Coffee Yield Expected.

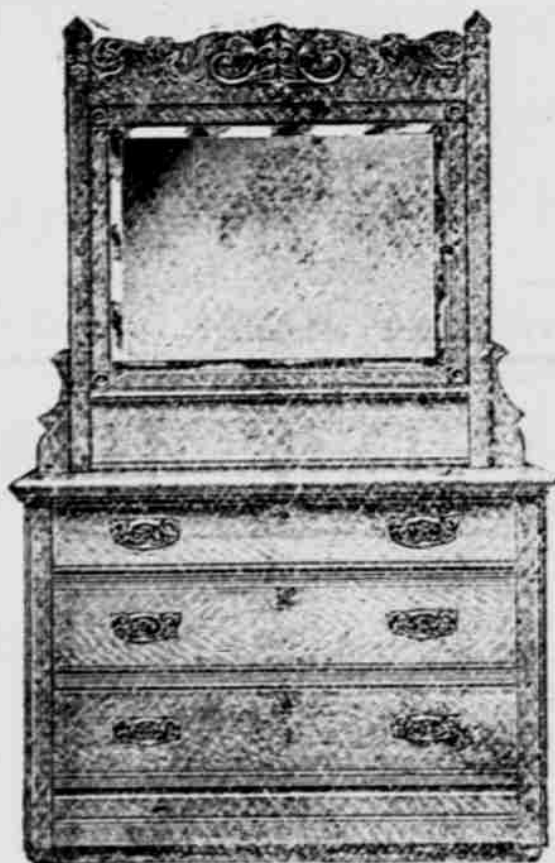

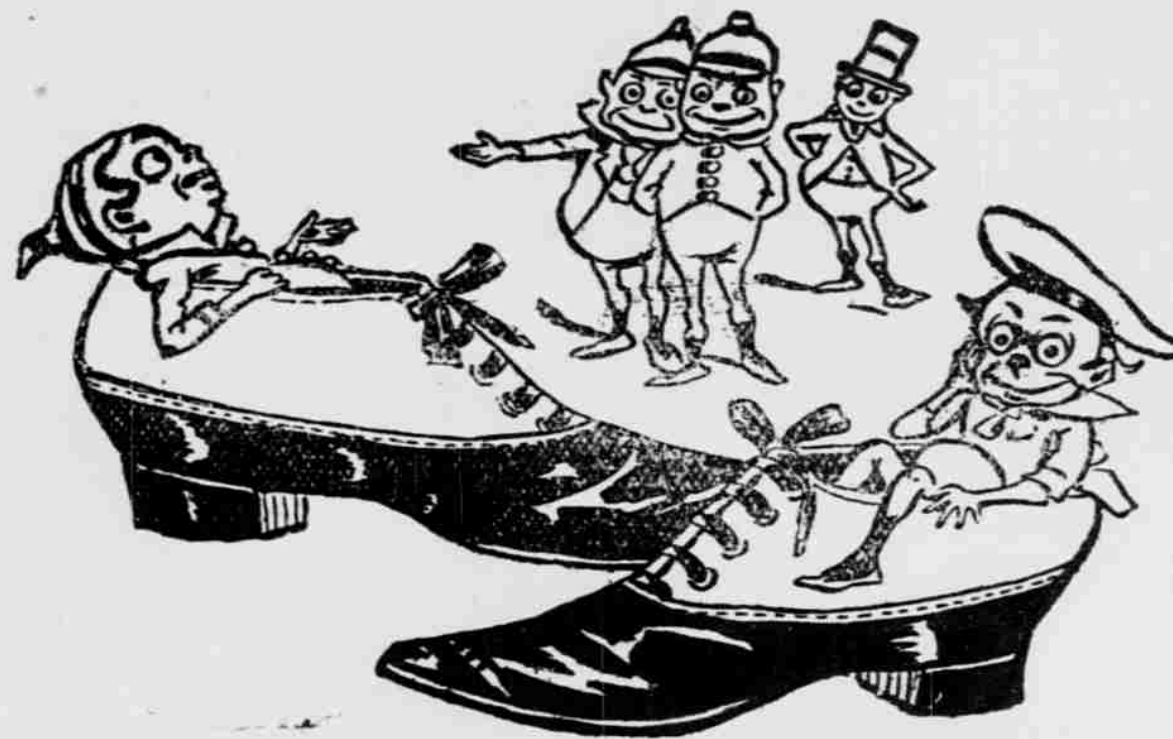
