More Lectures on History of the Church.

The subject treated last night was "The History of the Church from the Third to Seventh Century," during which time the quarrel took place between Arius and Athanasius, presbyter and bishop, respectively, of Alexandria, concerning the nature of Christ, which split the Church, forming what were called the ortho- dox and heterodox branches, and between these two factions was waged the bitterest warfare and persecution, the "orthodoxy" being shifted as the numeral strength of a party, gave it the supremacy over its opponent. Thus began, by the jealous grasping for position and power, the great Apostasy from which the religious world has not yet fully extricated itself.
