

ROBERT LOUIS STEVENSON.

Death of the Noted Novelist at Samoa.

PASSED AWAY VERY SUDDENLY

Buried in a Beautiful Spot in the Rear of His Home—Was in Honolulu Last Year to Recover Failing Health—The News a Blow to Many Friends Here.

Robert Louis Stevenson died at his home in Samoa Sunday, December 2d. His death was very sudden and none of the particulars are given.

He was buried Monday afternoon on the high hill back of his residence.

This sad news will be received with unfeigned sorrow by everyone who has ever read his works, and especially by the residents of Honolulu, many of whom were personally acquainted with him.

Mr. Stevenson has passed through Honolulu on several occasions, and it was only a little over a year ago that ill-health compelled him to leave his Samoan home and make a visit of several weeks to Honolulu in order to

recuperate. During his last stay here he lived a somewhat retired life at Sans Souci and at times was accessible only to a few intimate friends, owing to his illness.

At other times when feeling better he would be seen driving about town and laughing and chatting with all whom he met. During one of these latter periods he was prevailed on to give a lecture before the Scottish Thistle Club, of which he was an honorary member.

The writer was among those who were favored with an invitation to the lecture, or, as Mr. Stevenson called it, "a quiet talk." This was in September, 1893. Arrangements were made for a public lecture in the Y. M. C. A. building afterwards, but poor health caused the distinguished novelist to cancel the engagement.

Robert Louis Stevenson comes from a noted family. His grandfather was Robert Stevenson, the great Scotch engineer who built many wonderful lighthouses. In 1814 Sir Walter Scott made a voyage with him around Scotland in the lighthouse yacht. Thirty-six years afterward Robert Stevenson wrote his reminiscences of this voyage which appeared in the October Scribner's with an entertaining note by Robert Louis Stevenson.

He was born and educated in Scotland but has been a resident of Samoa for many years. At the time of his death he was writing a critical paper on Bunyan as an introduction to a new edition of the "Pilgrim's Progress." The book is to be issued as one of the new series of "English Classics" edited by W. E. Henley.

THE ARAWA IN PORT.

Six Passengers for Honolulu—She Leaves at 10 O'Clock.

The Shaw, Savill and Albion Company's steamship Arawa arrived this morning at 1 o'clock from Sydney, Auckland and Samoa, under the flag of the Union Steamship Company of New Zealand, she having been chartered to take the place of the Monowai in the San Francisco mail service.

The R. M. S. S. Arawa left Sydney on the 26th ult. and reached Auckland on the evening of the 30th; left the next day and arrived at Samoa on the 5th, at 10 p.m.; remained there until noon the next day.

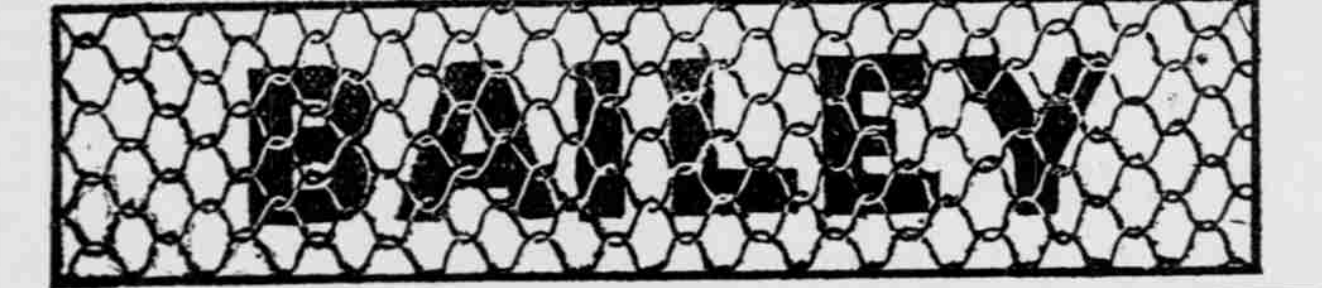
