

SQUAD EIGHT TO BE DIVIDED.

Will Then Be Known as Fifth Division, Citizens' Guard.

Resignation of Corporal Dement in Order to Make Complete Re-organization. Meeting at Reform School.

Squad Eight, Citizens' Guard, met last night at the usual place. The report of the committee appointed to present the squad's grievances to the officers of the Citizens' Guard, made its report in the shape of Captain McStocker's reply, which was printed in the ADVERTISER.

The next meeting will be held at the Reform School, Thursday, April 25th, when re-organization will be completed. This place was chosen in order to make it more convenient for members of the squad residing beyond Kamehameha School. Each member was instructed to act as a committee of one to bring in new recruits.

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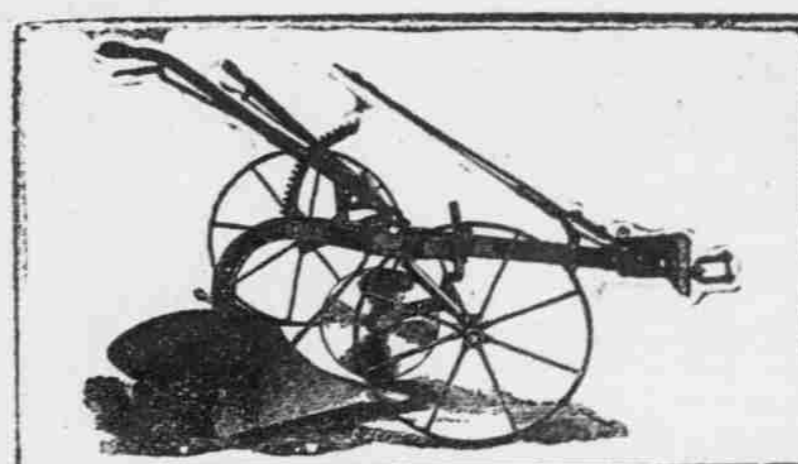
