Branch of Sons of American Revolution to be Formed.

ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING SATURDAY

Committee Appointed to Begin Arrangement Work—Membership Blanks to be Printed—Those Wishing to Join Society Should Apply to P. C. Jones.

The announcement that a preliminary meeting would be held in the Safe Deposit office Saturday noon, having for its object the formation of a branch society of Sons of the American Revolution, attracted a large number of people. Many of those present had credentials showing eligibility to membership, while others were positive evidence could be readily procured.

Chief Justice Judd was appointed chairman, John Effinger being selected as secretary. The following gentlemen were present: P. C. Jones, Rev. Dr. Birnie, Dr. C. B. Cooper, F. S. Dodge, M. F. Crandall, H. W. Severance, Rev. S. E. Bishop, C. M. Cooke, Professor Alexander, J. W. Jones, W. A. Kinney, R. B. Brenham, R. W. Meyers, Professor C. J. Lyons, C. S. Bradford, Arthur Johnstone, W. C. Parke, W. W. Chamberlain, Mr. Forbes and others. A number of names were handed in by those present.

Mr. Severance presented correspondence from officers of the California branch outlining procedure for forming a branch organization.

Mr. Jones read the constitution of the National order. The chairman explained that all lineal descendants of those who participated in the Revolutionary war, over 21 years of age, were eligible for membership. The insignia of the National body, to which P. C. Jones, A. F. Judd, E. A. Jones, W. C. Parke and R. B. Brenham were already members, was passed around for inspection.

Announcement was made declaring fifteen members necessary to form a branch; also information as to how records could be searched through the Secretary of State, etc.

On motion of C. M. Cooke, Messrs. P. C. Jones, H. W. Severance and the chairman were named as a committee to perform necessary arrangement work for the new branch.

Blank forms of application were ordered printed. Any one desiring to become a member will be furnished all necessary information by P. C. Jones.

The meeting was very enthusiastic throughout. Adjournment was made subject to the call of the chairman.

**Corn Mill on Maui.**

The Haleakala ranch at Makawao, Maui, recently leased a corn mill from L. Von Tempsky, which has been doing such a profitable business of late that one three times its size will be built very soon. On April 20th 500 tons of corn was sent to Spreckelsville plantation. Haleakala ranch obtains its corn from the settlers in the vicinity of Makawao, who have found the raising of it quite a paying industry.

**Solid Banking Institution.**

The thirtieth report of the Yokohama Specie Bank, Limited, shows the gross profits of that institution for the half year ending December 31, 1894 to be over 1,711,589 yen. The paid up capital is 4,500,000 yen, reserve fund 3,629,000 yen and the reserve fund for the equalization of dividends 299,000 yen. A dividend of 15 per cent per annum has been declared by the directors.

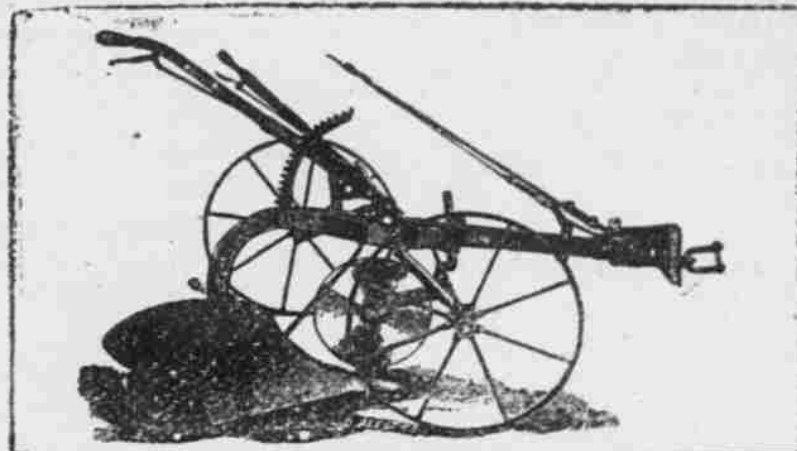
