

# Hawaiian Gazette Supplement of Wednesday, Aug. 4, 1880.

## AN ACT MAKING SPECIFIC APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE USE OF THE GOVERNMENT DURING THE TWO YEARS WHICH WILL END WITH THE 31ST DAY OF MARCH, IN THE YEAR ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-TWO.

Be it Enacted by the King and the Legislative Assembly of the Hawaiian Islands in the Legislature of the Kingdom assembled:

SECTION 1. The following sums, amounting to Two Million One Hundred and Ninety-Six Thousand and Six Dollars and Seventy-Five Cents, are hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury for the service of the Biennial Fiscal Period, commencing with April 1st, 1880, and ending with March 31st, 1882.

SECTION 2. The Minister of Finance shall credit the appropriations of the last biennial fiscal period all the amounts appropriated by the Act approved on the 5th day of August, A. D. 1878, and remaining unexpended on the 31st day of March, A. D. 1880, not otherwise re-appropriated, and such amounts shall be deemed no longer available for the objects for which they were originally appropriated.

SECTION 3. The Minister of Finance shall continue to pay the salaries appropriated by this Act, the compensation of soldiers and constables, the compensation of school teachers and the current expenses of the Bureau of Education, the Board of Health, the expenses of the Fire Department, of the Supreme and Circuit Courts, Government Stocks and the interest accruing thereon, the support of prisoners and the expenses of the leper settlements, until the 30th day of June, A. D. 1882, unless new appropriations are made before that date.

SECTION 4. The Minister of Finance shall not cause or allow to be paid from the Treasury any money for objects not provided by this law.

SECTION 5. It shall be lawful for Heads of Departments, in cases where special appropriations may fall short, to apply to the same the surplus of other special appropriations in the same Department not required to be expended, so as to make up the deficiency; each Head of Department duly accounting to the Legislature for such transfer.

SECTION 6. No person holding more than one office for which salaries are provided shall be authorized to draw for more than the salary of the highest grade of office held by him, if the salary of any office held by him shall amount to two thousand dollars or more per annum, and he shall be entitled to no other or further compensation.

SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect from and after the date of its approval.

**The Legislature.**

SEVENTH DAY, FRIDAY, JULY 23, 1880.

Mr. Aholo moved to reconsider the bill to regulate the sale of liquor. Carried.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the memorial signed by the merchants, and recommended its passage. Adopted.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS.

Mr. G. N. Wilcox read a resolution that the bill relating to the sharing of fines by the prosecuting witness be taken from the table. Carried.

Mr. Wilcox read a resolution that the Report of the Finance Committee be taken from the table, and be set as the special order for to-morrow. Lost.

The bill not to pay any officers of the government who absent themselves from the kingdom was then taken up, and indefinitely postponed.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The bill abolishing the Minister of War and Navy was then read a second time and passed. The House took a recess at 12 m., and on re-assembling at 1 p. m. the item for the increased expenses of the Legislative assembly of 1880 to \$20,000 was then moved and passed.

Mr. Aholo moved to throw out the item for a Marine Railway. Lost.

Mr. Aholo moved to increase the permanent settlement of Her Majesty Queen Dowager Emma to \$15,000. Carried.

Mr. Likialani moved to increase the pay of Queen Kapiolani to \$10,000. Carried.

Mr. Aholo moved to reconsider the item for subsidy to foreign line of steamers. Lost.

Mr. Wilcox moved to insert \$45,000 for buying a yacht revenue tug. Lost.

The bill relating to the sharing of fines with the prosecuting witness was then read a second time and passed to engrossment, to be read a third time on Wednesday next.

The bill to regulate the sale of liquor was then read and on motion it was set as a special order for Monday next.

The bill to abolish the tax on animals was then read a second time and returned.

The bill relating to corporations established in this kingdom was then read a second time and on motion passed to engrossment, to be read a third time on Wednesday next.

The bill to regulate the pilot fees for the ports of Kahului and Hilo was then read a second time and passed to engrossment, to be read a third time on Wednesday next.

The bill relating to wills of deceased persons was read a second time and passed to engrossment, to be read a third time on Thursday next.

The bill relating to laundries was read a second time and passed to engrossment, to be read a third time on Thursday next.

The bill to issue royal patents for lands transferred for school purposes was read a second time and passed to engrossment, to be read a third time on Thursday next.

The bill relating to lepers was read a second time and passed to engrossment, to be read a third time on Thursday next.

Adjourned.

SEVENTH DAY, THURSDAY, JULY 23.

On suspension of the rules the minority of the Special Committee to whom was referred the petition from the lepers at Kalawao, reported that the petition was not a genuine one, and recommended that the appointment of a doctor should be with the Board of Health. Laid on the table to be considered with the majority report.

The bill to regulate the sale of liquor which was referred the ten million loan bill, reported favorably to the passage of the same. Laid on the table to be considered with the majority report.

The bill to regulate the sale of liquor was then considered, section by section, and passed with some amendments, to be engrossed on its third reading on Thursday next.

House adjourned.

SEVENTH DAY, THURSDAY, JULY 23, 1880.

Mr. Kakaia moved to reconsider the item for Kapiolani Park. Carried.

Mr. Kakaia moved to reconsider the bill to abolish the Minister of War and Navy. Carried.

On suspension of the rules the Minister of Interior read a petition from Kalawao. Referred to a Committee consisting of Messrs. Rhodes, Philpo and Hanama.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS.

Mr. Aholo gave notice of a bill to regulate the sale of liquor in this kingdom. On suspension of the rules the bill was read for the first time, and on further suspension of the rules the bill was read a second time and passed to engrossment to be read a third time on Friday next.

Mr. Kakaia moved to bring in as a special order for to-day the bill abolishing the Minister of War and Navy.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

The bill was then read and passed to engrossment to be read third time on Friday.

The bill allowing Chinese doctors to practice in this kingdom was read a second time and referred to a Special Committee consisting of Messrs. Kaulokua, Minister of Interior, Cleghorn and Kaai.

The bill relating to companies established in the Kingdom or abroad was then read and passed to engrossment to be read a third time on Friday next.

Mr. Aholo moved to reconsider the item for Kapiolani Park. Carried.

On suspension of the rules Mr. Aholo read a resolution to the effect that the bill allowing the sale of liquor which was passed and had been sent to the King for signature, be brought up again for further consideration.

The chair ruled that the resolution was out of order.

Mr. Aholo appealed from the ruling of the Chair. The ayes and noes were taken and the Chair's ruling was not sustained. Adjourned.

SEVENTH DAY, THURSDAY, JULY 23, 1880.

Mr. S. W. Kaai presented a petition from South Kona asking that Mr. A. F. Waha be appointed a doctor for North and South Kona, and that his pay be \$300 a year. Referred to the Minister of Finance.

The majority of Special Committee to whom was referred the bill to amend Chapter 35 of the Session Laws of 1878 reported that the bill be indefinitely postponed. Laid on table to be considered with the majority report.

Mr. Nahaia moved that this report be printed and be delivered to each member. Carried.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS.

Mr. Hanama read a resolution that the House have no confidence in the memorial signed by the merchants, and published in the newspapers of this city.

The House went into a lengthy discussion on the resolution.

At 12 m. the House took a recess, and on re-assembling at 1 p. m. the resolution was passed, and amendments, to engrossment, and to be sent to the King.

The House adjourned.

SEVENTH DAY, THURSDAY, JULY 23.

Mr. Gibson read a resolution asking the Minister of Finance whether he ever received a communication from any one asking the privileges of water, wharfage and lights for any foreign lines of steamers.

His Ex. S. G. Wilder replied that the privileges were given to the party who asked for the same.

Mr. Kalua moved to reconsider the resolution brought in yesterday relating to the memorial signed by the merchants. Carried.

The bill abolishing the Minister of War and Navy was then read a third time and passed.

The bill to regulate the sale of the stalls of the market was then read a second time, and referred to a special committee consisting of Messrs. Kaulokua, M. Hanama, Likialani, Wilder and Hanama.

The House took a recess at 12 m., and on re-assembling at 1 p. m. Mr. Kalua moved to postpone the consideration of the liquor bill till Thursday next. Carried.

His Ex. J. M. Kepena moved to consider the Appropriation Bill on its third reading. The House waited for the English version for half an hour and then the item for Kapiolani Park was inserted for \$5,000 and passed.

Mr. Aholo moved to raise the salary of the Minister of Interior to \$12,000. Passed. The salaries of the rest of the Ministers were also raised to \$12,000 each. Passed.

Mr. Aholo moved to insert in the Appropriation Bill the sum of \$20,000 for the China Line. Lost.

House adjourned.

SEVENTH DAY, WEDNESDAY, JULY 22.

The Special Committee to whom was referred the bill allowing Chinese doctors to practice among the countrymen, reported favorably, and recommended its passage to include the practice among other nationalities. Laid on the table to be considered with the bill.

RESOLUTIONS AND BILLS.

The Minister of Interior informed the House that His Majesty declined to sign the liquor bill.

Mr. Wilcox read a resolution that the school agent at Makawao be removed from his office as such, and that Mr. Beckley be appointed in his stead. Lost.

Mr. S. W. Kaai read a resolution that \$300 be inserted for a lock-up at South Kona. Laid on the table.

Mr. Kaan gave notice of a bill to supply the prisoners and soldiers with provisions by tender. The lowest bid should have it. Passed under the rule.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

On the third reading of the Appropriation Bill Mr. Kalua moved to insert \$20,000 for a China line of steamers. Passed after a long discussion.

Messrs. Likialani, Baker, Kaulokua, Kaulokua, Kaanaana, Aholo, Gibson, Nahaia, Kalua, H. W. Wilcox, Cleghorn, Hanama, Wahine, Kaunama, Kaunama, Mahoe, Kaunama, Kapaha, Kapaha, Bush, Kahana, Martin, and S. S. Kaai, New; Dominis, Kanoe, Cleghorn, Castle, Kapena, Wilder, Preston, Rhodes, Smith, Judd, Kanikou, Kanikou, Woods, S. W. Kaai, Philpo and G. W. Wilcox.

Mr. Kalua moved to raise the salary of H. R. H. Likialani to \$8,000. Passed.

Mr. Hanama moved to insert \$400 for the keeper of Lunalilo's tomb. Passed.

Mr. Kaunama moved to raise the salary of the Marshal to \$8,000. Lost.

The Minister of Foreign Affairs moved to insert \$8,000 for a doctor at Kalawao. Lost.

Mr. Likialani moved to raise the salary of the Chief Justice to \$15,000. Lost.

Mr. Kalua moved to strike out the \$25 for Keaweanahi. Lost.

Mr. Hanama moved to re-engross the Appropriation Bill and to be read a third time on Friday next. Passed.

Adjourned.

On suspension of the rules the minority of the Special Committee to whom was referred the petition from the lepers at Kalawao, reported that the petition was not a genuine one, and recommended that the appointment of a doctor should be with the Board of Health. Laid on the table to be considered with the majority report.

The bill to regulate the sale of liquor which was referred the ten million loan bill, reported favorably to the passage of the same. Laid on the table to be considered with the majority report.

The bill to regulate the sale of liquor was then considered, section by section, and passed with some amendments, to be engrossed on its third reading on Thursday next.

House adjourned.

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
