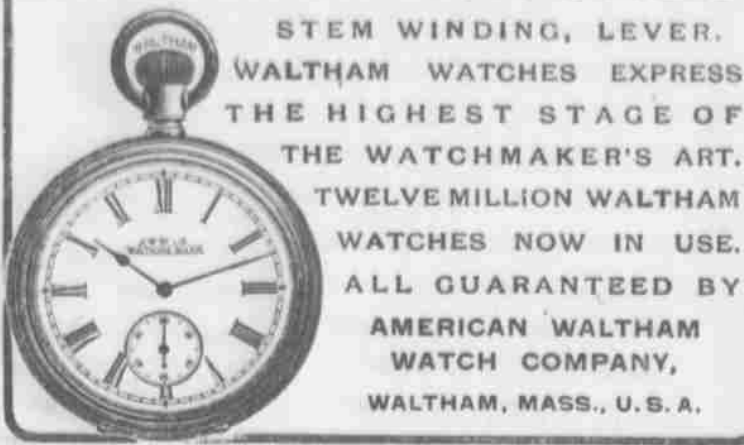

WILL CELEBRATE TOGO'S VICTORY

Japanese Will Hold a National Fete at Aala Park on Friday Evening Next.

The Japanese of Honolulu are not going to allow the great victory of Admiral Togo over the Russians to pass without proper celebration. Tomorrow evening has been set apart for the celebration and from 7:30 on, Aala Park will be the scene of great gaiety.

A meeting was held yesterday at the Japanese theatre when there were present representatives from the Japanese Merchants' Association, Japanese Veterans' Association, Japanese Hotel Keepers' Association, Young Men's Buddhist Association and the Japanese labor organizations, and the decision was reached to have the celebration come off on Friday, which would give the people two whole days in which to prepare.

The celebration will be in general charge of Manager Kishi of the Yokohama Specie Bank and Japanese Consul-General Miki Saito will deliver an address. There will also be speeches by the representatives of the different Japanese organizations. Fireworks will form one of the principal features of the evening. There will be geisha dances by troupes of young Japanese girls, sword dances, wrestling bouts and broadsword exercises. The Hawaiian Band will be present.

Every Japanese attending is expected to carry a Japanese lantern, or as many as he or she wishes to display, and there will be many floats expressive of Togo's great victory.

ADULTERANTS AND POISONS

FOOD COMMISSIONER DUNCAN FINDS MUCH INFERIOR MILK AND PATENT FOODS.

Food Commissioner Duncan's report for the month of April was presented to the Board of Health yesterday afternoon. Among the samples of milk examined were some which had come from Makaweli, Kauai and which were found to contain corrosive sublimate, a deadly poison. Dr. Duncan reported that a number of Japanese who had taken the milk had become violently ill, vomiting having saved their lives. The police of Kauai are trying to find out how the poison was introduced, but are without any clue.

The commissioner reported that during the month he had examined 73 samples of milk and found nine of them below standard. The delinquent purveyors of milk were a Jap for George Holt, M. Abreu, Sr., J. Richards, Talchew, M. Duarte, P. Perreira, driver for A. Tavares and an unnamed person connected with a sample sent to the office by a private party. Perreira pleaded guilty in the District Court to selling adulterated milk and was fined \$10 and costs.

The three following samples of foods were found adulterated:

Army & Navy Brand, California Extracted Honey, Haas Brothers, San Francisco, California. Sample from Lewis & Co., Adulterated with glucose. S. & W. Brand, Strictly Pure California Honey, Packed by Sussman, Wormser & Co., San Francisco. Sample from C. Q. Yee Hop & Co., Adulterated with glucose. Eagle Brand, California Extracted Honey, Eagle Honey Co., San Francisco, California. Sample from H. May & Co., Adulterated with glucose.

Food condemned: One lot of 8 packages mustard; one lot of 12 packages pepper; one lot of 1 case sausage; one lot of 13 cans jam.

The report concludes as follows:

"The results of the analyses of a number of samples of maple syrup are withheld for a later report, as evidence of adulteration cannot be obtained by chemical means. There is a physical method of examining these products, but the laboratory is not equipped with the proper apparatus for its work. I thought it best to delay my report on these samples until a definite report as to their purity can be made.

"If it meets with your approval, I desire to delay the filing of my monthly report for about thirty days. This time will give an opportunity for correspondence with manufacturers of adulterated foods. I have found it more satisfactory to deal direct with manufacturers, when their names can be secured, than with our local dealers.

"The first week of this month was spent on Maui, where I gave testimony in the case of Territory vs. Scott, selling adulterated liquor. This liquor was the one referred to in my last report as being grossly adulterated. The jury acquitted the defendant of the charge of selling adulterated liquor."
