POLICE WILL HOLD THE GLAMMING MONEY

HENRY WILL NOT TURN MONEY OVER UNTIL ATTORNEY GENERAL PASSES ON MATTER.

Until High Sheriff Henry secures an opinion from the Attorney General on the matter, no more money seized as evidence in gambling cases will be turned into the government as a realization. The custom under the former regime was to turn all of such money over to the treasurer. High Sheriff Henry is of the opinion that in the absence of any law specifically declaring such money forfeited, it should be returned to the owner. Such money he says after being used as evidence, has served its purpose and should not, the Sheriff thinks, be seized by the authorities unless the law specifically provides for such disposition.

For the present the money obtained by the police in such cases will be held in the evidence room. If the attorney general decides that the money should be turned into the treasury such disposition will be made of it and if he decides that the money should be returned to the alleged gamblers, then they will be allowed to secure their former property.

AFTER ONE OF THE REPRESENTATIVES

Cecil Brown has begun action to foreclose mortgage on R. W. Aylett.

Action has been begun by Cecil Brown as trustee against R. W. Aylett the representative elect. Mrs. Aylett, Thomas Randall and wife, Allen & Robinson and James L. Holt and G. L. Doshia as trustees, to foreclose a mortgage for \$5,000.

According to the complaint Aylett and his wife gave a note for \$5,000 on April 14, 1899, giving as security a mortgage on some property on and off of Fort street at Kaliu, containing 3 rods. The other defendants in the suit have acquired some interest in the property.

MOOHEAU HALL IS ACCEPTED

Hilo's Building Named After Admiral Beckley's Ancestor, is a Neat Piece of Work.

HILO, Dec. 27.—The Park Board have accepted the building hereafter to be known as Mooheau Hall, and Contractor Erickson has been paid in full for his services. The contract price was \$2,965, and the extras, which were voted by the Hilo Board of Trade, brought the final cost up to \$3,228. The extra charges were for changes in the specifications, such as increased plumbing work, changed location of closets, closed casement for the balustrade, which cost altogether \$263, and were paid for by the Board of Trade. The pavilion is octagonal, prettily designed and artistically painted in serviceable colors. The sloping roof is shingled and stained a dark green. The posts supporting the roof are substantial columns, surmounted by ornate capitals.

Speaking of the satisfactory manner in which Contractor Erickson had carried out his contract, Chairman Richards of the Park Board said: "The building is very satisfactory and is an edifice of which the Hilo public might well be proud. The Park Board is much pleased with the manner in which the contractor has completed his work, and all that now remains is the dedication, which will take place on New Year's Day."—Hilo Tribune.

NO OLAA WHOLESALE.

HILO, December 27.—Olaa will no longer have a wholesale liquor house. Governor Carter has refused to renew to J. P. Lino the wholesale liquor license heretofore held by George C. Stratmeyer at 9-Miles, Olaa. This
