# SUICIDE WAS NOT PREMEDITATED

(Continued from page one.)

his education as a civil and electrical engineer, so that, if his advancement in the army was not as rapid as he wished, he could resign and enter civil life in those capacities.

"Mrs. George Renton, of Ewa Plantation, near Honolulu, is now in Madison—her former home. Mrs. Renton is a daughter of the late James E. and Mrs. Sopronia Lewis. Lieutenant Garber spent a day at her home in May and she states she heard of him frequently through his association with the best families in the island. Neither his appearance, conduct nor what she heard of him, gave any intimation that he drank, nor did she once ever think of such a thing nor does she believe anything of the kind.

"Since writing the above—in the noon mail today—an unfinished letter of many pages, written by Lieutenant Garber, was received from Lieut. Trotter, U. S. A., who took charge of Lieut. Garber's papers. It is full of the great happiness about to be consummated in his approaching marriage, and breaks off abruptly with the statement that the wagon had called for him to go to the Hamilton supper."

From Camp McKinley, Capt. Nichols and Lieutenant Trotter, associates of the late officer, both wrote letters of condolence to the father of their dead comrade, as follows:

"Camp McKinley, Honolulu, T. H. July 6th, 1904.  
"Mr. M. C. Garber, Madison, Ind., Sir: Lieutenant Garber was a brilliant officer and had the respect and admiration of all who knew him. I have known him intimately at the Presidio and here since October of last year and I never had a truer, more unselfish friend. Anything little or mean was foreign to his nature.

"Considering his short stay in Honolulu, he was well known, and the esteem in which he was held was attested by the way every one attempted to honor him at the last. The funeral was largely attended and a great many beautiful flowers were sent.

"He was so bright and cheerful, such a good comrade, that our grief at his leaving us is only less than yours. If there is anything I can do, I am entirely at your service. Very respectfully,

"Mr. M. C. Garber, Madison, Ind.: My Dear Sir: As the tent-mate and friend of your son the late Guilford S. Garber it is my painful duty to inform you personally of that of which you have no doubt already learned officially from the War Department, namely: the death of your son, which sad occurrence took place at 2 o'clock a. m. in the morning of July 3rd.

"His death has cast a shadow over the spirits of the whole city and has been a sad blow to his brother officers and the enlisted men of this garrison, he having endeavored himself to all by his genial disposition and bon camaraderie.

I knew him and liked him at the Presidio, and having lived in the same tent with him here, he has been more intimate with me than with any one else in the garrison, and I am able to say that I have never known another man whom I admired and liked more as a man, an officer and a friend. I can do no more than express to you for myself, and on behalf of the officers, ladies and enlisted men of this garrison our heartfelt sympathy for you and your family in your bereavement.

"Again tendering to you our most profound sympathy, I am, Sir, Very respectfully,

The theory that excessive drinking caused the suicide is not credited by Garber's former associates and his family. The Louisville Courier-Journal, one of the leading papers in Kentucky, has the following regarding the deceased lieutenant, who was formerly in Louisville.

"Investigations into the death of Lieutenant Guilford Garber, of Madison Ind., who shot himself while stationed in Honolulu recently, show that he committed the rash act while suffering from temporary insanity. This is the report made by Congressman Marion Griffith, of the Fourth Congressional district in Indiana, from which Lieut. Garber was appointed to the regular service, as well as by several prominent physicians who are familiar with Lieut. Garber's life, habits and military experience. He served in the Philippines with distinction and for a protracted term, and it is believed by those who have made the investigation that he is another of the numerous victims of the Philippine climate.

"After Young Garber returned from his two-year Philippine service and during the six months he was at his old home in Madison, prior to his appointment to the regular service, he was never known to take a drink of intoxicants. It has been learned from his friends and associates while in San Francisco he was a close student of military affairs and a hard worker which, together with his sobriety, ambition and aptitude, secured for him an appointment as instructor over others older and more experienced.

"Those who have investigated the cause of Lieutenant Garber's suicide declare that any social drinking he may have done after leaving San Francisco for Honolulu was incidental with his insanity, and if he was drinking to excess, it was preceded by the mental derangement.

"To those in Louisville who were brigaded with Lieut. Garber in the Philippines, he was known as a studious, diligent, conscientious, lovable fellow, pleased with army life and ambitious to rise in the officers' list. Every energy was bent in that direction and letters were written in the happiest vein and indicated his great satisfaction with the progress he was making."

# TRAVESTY STARS UP AGAINST IT

MEMBER OF THE COMPANY SAYS THEY DID NOT MAKE ANY MONEY IN HONOLULU AND ARE ON THE VERGE OF DISSOLUTION IN AUSTRALIA—KOLB AND DILL'S FALLING OUT WHILE HERE.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 18.—Miss Catherine Roberts, niece of the famous Tony Pastor and at one time an understudy to Miss Anna Held, returned from Honolulu today on the steamship Sonoma after a varied experience with the American Travesty Stars, which she says are on the verge of dissolution in the Antipodes.

Ten weeks of arduous labor with the company and not a cent of money for her trouble and stranded in a strange place with no funds from the managers for return passage was the unpleasant predicament she found herself in after a week's engagement at the islands. Miss Roberts tells the following story of the company and its alleged mismanagement.

"Jealousy pure and simple among the members of the troupe from the bill posters up was the cause of the collapse of a venture that cost its promoters something like \$40,000 so far," the petit young actress said. "When we were engaged in this city everything looked as rosy and bright as could be, but we had been gone only a week when the trouble started. Kolb and Dill had the first row over advertising matter. Each thought the other was getting too much press work and then there was an estrangement, which resulted in the two splitting and Kolb nearly left the company at Honolulu to return here. Harry James prevailed upon him to remain and they gave a couple of stage kisses and made up. Mr. James, the manager, is very pleasant, always had a good word to speak and makes many promises which are never fulfilled. They made no money at Honolulu and pulled out of there for Australia with just enough to pay the transportation. I intend stopping at the St. Francis for a few days and will then go East, whence I was cabled by Klaw and Erlanger for a season's work. No more Travesty Stars for me, thank you."

Among others on the Sonoma was Mrs. L. Andrews, wife of the Attorney-General at Honolulu. She is visiting friends in this city and will remain here for about one month. Three members of another ill-fated theatrical venture took passage on the steamer and were glad to get back to the city. They belonged to the Sanford company, whose collapse came after a strenuous season in Australia.

## JAPANESE RESTORING DALNY.

DALNY, Manchuria, by the steamer to Chefoo, July 12.—This town, which was left in a dismantled condition by the Russians when they abandoned it, has been practically restored by the Japanese, who are maintaining rigid discipline. Commerce is again brisk, and the Chinese who were driven out before the evacuation have returned.

The water works have not yet been restored, but the wharves have all been repaired. The entrance to the harbor is still dangerous, owing to the presence there of the sunken hulks of fourteen small craft sunk by the Russians to keep out the Japanese. It is also believed that there are some sunken mines in the bay, but it is very difficult to locate them.
