## ONLY SUCCESSFUL RUSSIAN



VICE ADMIRAL BEZOBRAZOFF

Vice Admiral Bezobrazoff was with Skrydloff in Vladivostok and commanded the Russian cruisers which sunk several Japanese transports, inflicting the heaviest blow of the war on Japan, for the lost vessels carried heavy siege guns for the Port Arthur attack. The guns cannot be replaced and their loss will mean thousand of lives lost and a long delay in taking Port Arthur. Bezobrazoff has since been reported to have entered Port Arthur.

## BRITISH CLAIMS

GOVERNOR CARTER TOOK THEM UP WITH THE STATE DEPARTMENT WHILE IN WASHINGTON, WITH THE RESULT THAT AN INTERNATIONAL TRIBUNAL WILL BE APPOINTED TO INVESTIGATE THEM.

The long outstanding claims of different British subject against the Territory of Hawaii, for compensation for what they believe to be illegal imprisonment during revolutionary times, are at last in fair way towards a settlement. The matter has been used for a game of shuttlecock between different bodies and parties for some years and Governor Carter took the matter up with the Department of State during his recent trip to Washington.

"I went over the matter with the officials of the State Department," he said this morning, "and showed them that it was useless to refer it back to me, as all that I could do was to pass it back to the legislature with the result that the legislature would send it back to me for further reference to the State Department. After consultation it was decided to include the Hawaiian claims with a number of other matters which have to be adjudicated upon between the two governments. There are a number of different claims which British subjects have against the United States and others which American citizens have against Great Britain, and I understand an international tribunal will be appointed to consider all these."

## Russian Fleet Scattered Togo Pursues

(Associated Press Cable to The Star.)

SHANGHAI, August 13.—The Russian cruiser Askold has docked here. She has been notified to leave within 24 hours.

The vessels of the Russian fleet were scattered after the fight with Admiral Togo off Port Arthur. Some returned to Port Arthur while others sought refuge in various other ports. The battleship Czarevitch is badly damaged at Tsingchou. Admiral Togo is heading with his fleet toward Shanghai.

## JAPAN REPLIES

TOKIO, August 13.—Japan is sending a note to the Powers in connection with the protests arising out of the recent capture of the Russian torpedo boat destroyer Ryeshiteini in the harbor of Chefoo.

### RUSSIAN VESSELS DAMAGED.

TOKIO, August 13.—Admiral Togo reports that five out of the six Russian battleships engaged in the sea fight Wednesday were severely damaged.

### DESTROYERS STRANDED.

CHEFOO, August 13.—Two Russian destroyers are stranded at Weihaiwei.

### TURKEY YIELDS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, August 13.—Turkey has yielded to the demands of the United States.

### CHINESE WELCOME.

LIAOYANG, August 13.—The Chinese governor of Mukden has proclaimed welcome to the Japanese.

### HEAVY NAVAL FIGHTING.

TOKIO, August 13.—Heavy fighting at Port Arthur was in progress Tuesday and Wednesday. The Russian losses were enormous.

### COMMANDER KILLED.

ST. PETERSBURG, August 13.—Withoelt, the naval commander, was killed in Wednesday's sea fight with the Japanese.

## DEMOCRATS HAVE NO FIGHT

WILL ELECT DELEGATES FOR VARIOUS CONVENTIONS THIS AFTERNOON AND EVENING.

The Democracy will elect delegates to the district and territorial conventions today. The primaries are being held throughout the Territory. It is expected that the convention will be much larger than the last convention, as the basis of representation of one delegate for every ten members of a precinct club, is in force and there have been numerous increases of membership.

There does not appear to be any contest. No fight is on and little struggle for election to the various conventions is likely to occur. In the majority of precincts a single ticket was nominated. The voting hours are from 2 p. m. to 8 p. m.

The Democracy does not seem to be swayed with the throes of internal strife. Nobody seems to be falling over himself seeking nomination on the Democratic ticket. It is proposed to put a complete ticket in the field for this island. Fusion is being discussed by the various districts and some sort of a deal may be patched up with the Home Rulers. There is practically no opposition to the nomination of C. P. Lauka for Congressman.

The territorial convention will convene at 10 a. m. August 22 in Honolulu. Its business will be the nomination of a delegate to Congress, the framing of a platform and the election of a territorial central committee.

The district convention for Oahu will be held August 24 and for the other islands August 27.

Until today Manuel has been wearing a straggling black beard and his hair has been unkempt. He looked to be a man of forty or more but today when he went on duty his freshly shaved face and neatly trimmed hair showed him to be very much younger. The poor fellow is almost as much of a landmark as the statue he worships.

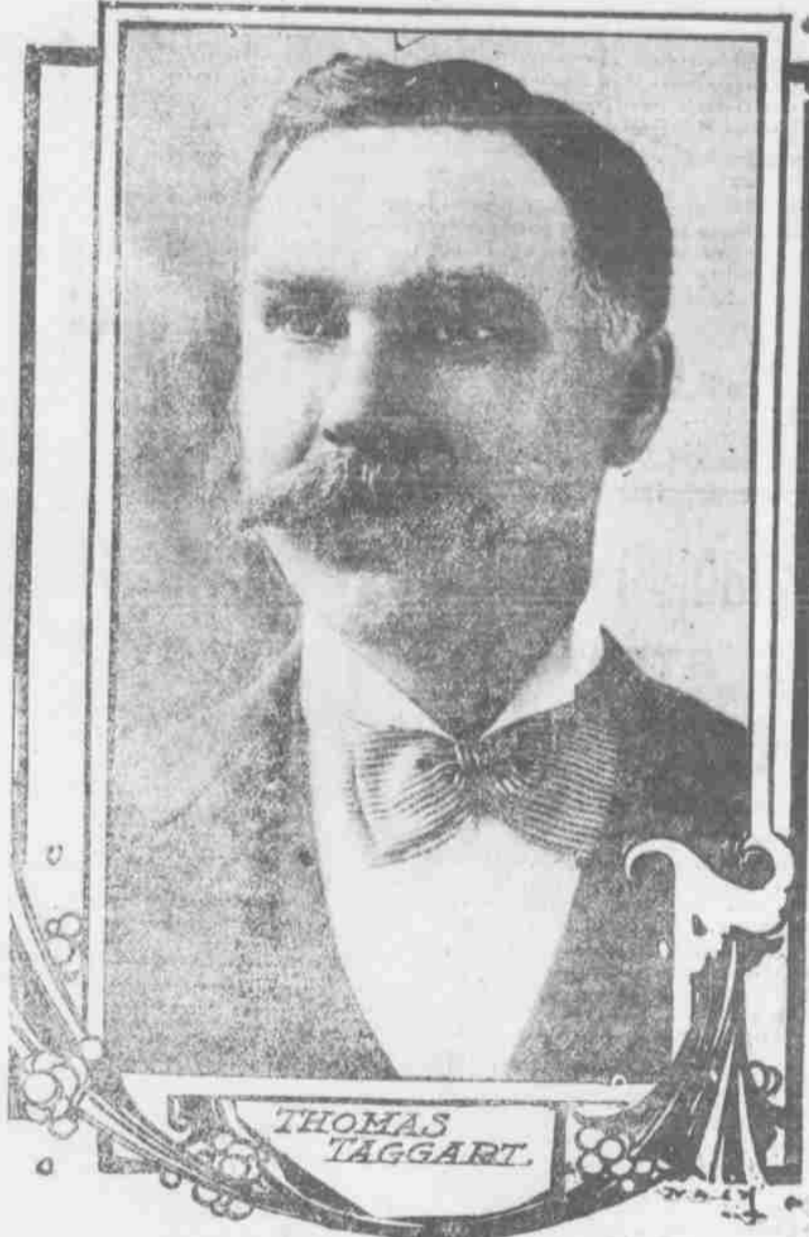

## ANDREWS MAY RESIGN

ATTORNEY GENERAL HAS DISCUSSED WITH THE GOVERNOR HIS WITHDRAWAL FROM OFFICE—CARTER HAS NO OBJECTION TO ANDREWS TAKING PART IN POLITICS AND SAYS HE IS VERY EFFICIENT OFFICER.

Attorney General Andrews' part in politics does not disturb Governor Carter. According to the governor's view of it the attorney general has just as much right to interest himself in politics as has any other citizen, and any protests to him on that score will meet with a chilly reception.

"Attorney General Andrews is a particularly hard-working and efficient officer of the government," said the governor this morning, "and the suggestion that he neglects his work to dabble in politics is absurd. The trouble is that those who are objecting to his course are merely doing so because he is not on their side. If he were, you would hear nothing at all about it. As a matter of fact he has come to me and has asked me to consider the question of his resigning, not on this account at all, but simply for the reason that he feels he is not doing justice to himself by retaining the position. He states that he can do better from a financial standpoint in private practice, and I have no doubt from my knowledge of his ability that this is so, but I have asked him not to resign, and I sincerely hope that he will not."
