THE BISHOP OPENS A SALOON

HENRY C. POTTER MAKES AN ADDRESS AT THE OPENING OF A SALOON IN NEW YORK AND A RELIGIOUS HYMN CLOSES THE EXERCISES—A REMARKABLE EXPERIMENT IN THE LIQUOR BUSINESS.

NEW YORK, August 2.—Bishop Henry C. Potter yesterday made the principal address at the formal opening of a saloon. The audience concluded the exercises by singing "Praise God, from Whom All Blessings Flow."
 Joseph Johnson, Jr., an ex-newspaper man, is the active director of the new enterprise.

The Subway tavern, as it is to be called, is founded on Earl Grey's English idea, and on the Norwegian system of governmental control, whereby the number and profits of the saloons are required to come within certain limits set by the government.

The site of the saloon is at the corner of Mulberry and Bleeker streets, near police headquarters.

Outside and inside, the tavern looks much like other saloons, except that its appointments are conceived in a more sprightly vein. The wide front door opens into a room occupied by a soda water fountain and a cigar stand. This is as far as women or girls are allowed. Behind it is the bar-room.

Every drink known to the saloon world, intoxicating or otherwise, is on sale at the bar. Lunch tables occupy part of the room, and there is a free lunch counter, from which food is served at noon without charge with every glass of beer.

At another table the daily papers and a number of current magazines are to be found.

Large numbers of original drawings by newspaper artists, both cartoons and news pictures, have been contributed for decorations. Boxes of plants line the window ledges. At the same time, the surroundings are not so elegant as to frighten the Bowery "hobo" away. The tavern has been open to business for two weeks, and is already paying its way.

"The people who are interested in this," said Mr. Johnson today, "have it in mind to provide a poor man's club. The idea is, if people must drink, to reduce the evils connected with it to the minimum. In this saloon there are no back rooms. No women are allowed in the barroom, and no minors or intoxicated persons are served. The rules in regard to hours are strictly observed, and we try to give our patrons more for their money than they get at any other saloon in town."

"We are selling what the saloons call 'private stock' at 10 cents, where every other saloon charges at least 15. All our goods are absolutely pure."

The saloon is owned by a stock company, whose principal contributors were Robert Fulton Cutting, president of the Citizens' union; W. Bayard Cutting, his brother; E. R. L. Gould, ex-city chamberlain; Herbert Parsons, V. Everitt Macy, Acosta Nichols, and Mr. Johnson. The company has a capital stock of \$10,000. The enterprise will not be a money making one, but proposes to pay 5 per cent on its capital stock.

TRYING TO SAVE WISCONSIN

WISCONSIN REPUBLICAN FACTIONS MAY AGREE TO LEAVE THEIR DIFFERENCES TO THE COURTS AND ABIDE BY THE DECISION, WITHDRAWING ONE OF THE TWO FACTION TICKETS NOW IN THE FIELD.

NEW YORK, August 4.—Wisconsin, with its prize of thirteen electoral votes, was the subject of two important conferences today, one by Democratic managers, who believe there is a chance to place the Badger State in the Democratic column, and one by Republican leaders, who see some danger of losing the State.

William F. Sheehan, chairman of the new Democratic campaign committee, had a long session with Edward C. Wall of Wisconsin, who is now the leading Democrat in the State. Wall was just back from a visit to Judge Parker and had given to the Democratic candidate his opinion that unless the outlook for the Republicans improved the State would go Democratic.

Wisconsin is divided into three hostile camps. One is Democratic and two are Republican.

There are two electoral and two State tickets in the field, both backed by Republicans of prominence, and each faction would rather see the Democrats win than have its foe triumph. One faction is headed by Governor La Follette, and he is opposed by what are known as the "Stalwarts," headed by Senator John C. Spooner, Senator Charles, Postmaster General Payne and Representative Joseph W. Babcock, who is chairman of the Republican Congressional committee.

Payne came over from Washington and met Senator Spooner and Representative Babcock by appointment. They had a long conference over the situation. The President is by no means in sympathy with the "Stalwarts," who took the bit in their teeth in the Chicago convention and had the La Follette delegates thrown out. He had requested that the whole dispute be left to the courts and that each member of the two seats of delegates be given one-half vote.

It is now suspected that the President, through Payne, is bringing pressure to bear upon Spooner and Babcock with the view of getting the case decided in the courts. If it be decided in favor of La Follette, the other side has promised to take down its ticket. Thus the electoral vote of Wisconsin may be said to hang on a court decision.

WILL TURN HEARST DOWN

TAMMANY DOES NOT LIKE ATTACK ON MURPHY AND McCLELLAN AND IS AFTER HEARST.

NEW YORK, August 1.—The Times says:

"Orders have gone forth from Tammany Hall that William Randolph Hearst shall be turned down for renomination as member of Congress from the Eleventh District. Mr. Hearst wants a renomination and will make a fight for what he believes to be his right to a second term. He desires to retain his seat in the House that he may further his plans for 1908."

"The reason for Charles F. Murphy's reported desire to have Mr. Hearst turned down lies largely in the attitude which has been assumed by the Hearst newspapers in attacking Murphy and McClellan. The Hearst managers have represented to Murphy that unless Hearst is renominated the Tammany leader will have to face the opposition of Hearst's papers and interests. In return Mr. Murphy is said to have told the managers that he never had the friendship of Hearst and his newspapers and that no opportunity has been lost to attack the present, as well as the Croker regime in Tammany Hall, and that McClellan had been subjected to unjust criticisms."
 "Hearst believes that he has an excellent chance to win a renomination, even in a fight with Tammany Hall, and already is preparing to make such a contest for delegates."
